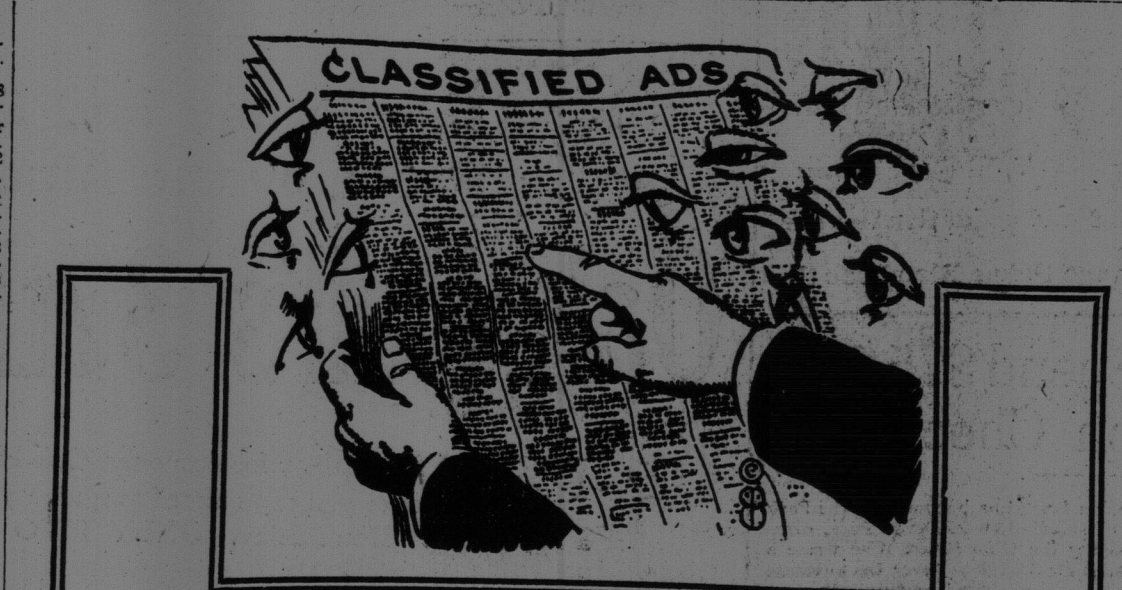

## JAPANESE FARMERS PROSPEROUS

**TOKYO**, Jan. 20.—A combination of good prices and good crops will bring the income of Japanese farmers this year to total half a billion yen, greater than last year, estimates Nakaji Kasai, president of the Government Hypothec Bank, the institution founded to finance domestic production.

This year's crop exceeds that of 1924 by some 20,000,000 bushels, while the average high price this year brings the excess value over last year's to 260,000,000 yen.

## DENVER MINT

**DENVER**, Colo., Jan. 20.—The 1925 mintage at the United States mint here was \$61,010,400, according to Frank E. Shepherd, superintendent.

Bullion handled during the year at the mint amounted to \$5,888,783.91. The mint drew on its play gold, Ecuador and Mexico for gold and silver and from nine states in addition to Colorado.
