

ASKS GOVERNMENT FOR FURTHER AID

Library Association Adopts Resolutions at Annual Meeting Here.

Resolutions, that the association marked with strong approval any steps taken to extend library facilities in New Brunswick; recommending the purchase by all libraries of the "Makers of Canada" volumes, devoted to the lives of, Howe, Wilnot, Tilley, Tupper, McDonald, George Brown, William Lyon Mackenzie, Baldwin, Lafontaine, Hince, and other worthies; urging the government of New Brunswick to enact such legislation as in other provinces has resulted in the establishment of free public libraries, where they are not already found; that the government be asked to raise this province to the same standard, in regard to support, as other provinces, and to give rural towns and villages the same advantages as regard library facilities, were passed at the annual meeting of the Maritime Library Association, held here yesterday at the Free Public Library, with the president, W. C. Miller in the chair.

In her report Miss Mary Kinley Ingraham, retiring secretary-treasurer, spoke of the Acadia Mail Library, and the wonderful success it had been. Mr. Miller, in his report, spoke most enthusiastically of the McGill traveling library, and also of the libraries in New Brunswick, situated in St. John, Fredericton, Moncton, Chatham, Woodstock.

The president's report closed with a table of comparisons showing the amount expended by the various governments for libraries in the latest Dominion statistics. The items were as follows: New Brunswick, \$6,185; Nova Scotia, \$16,292; Alberta, \$72,047; Saskatchewan, \$72,438; British Columbia, \$86,000.22; Manitoba, \$87,902; Ontario, \$872,000.

Officers Elected.

The election of officers resulted as follows: President, W. C. Miller; vice-president for Nova Scotia, Mrs. J. B. Hall, of Lawrenceton, N. S.; vice-president for New Brunswick, Miss Estelle Vaughan, St. John; Miss Ingraham's resignation from the office of secretary-treasurer was accepted gracefully and Mrs. Margaret Lawrence was appointed to the office until such time as a permanent secretary-treasurer could be appointed to convene again in Moncton in October. It is hoped to have an extensive programme for the Moncton meeting and a committee consisting of the executive and W. S. Fisher was appointed to arrange the programme.

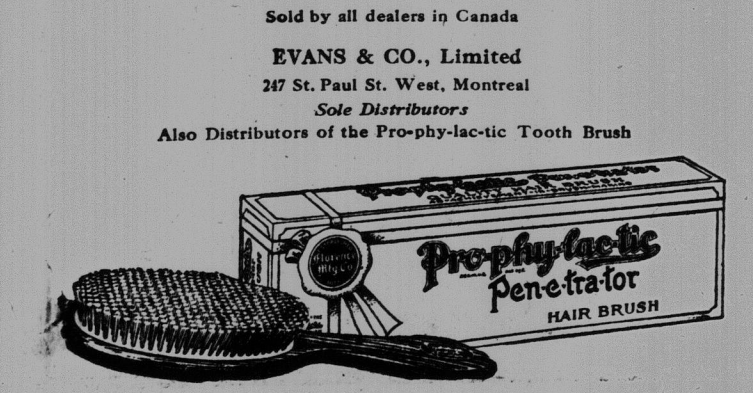

London, Aug. 28.—A despatch to Reuters from Calcutta says that the Maharaja Gekwar of Baroda the richest Prince of India, who died on board a train near Finsbury last night while on his way to the Holland city, but the Maharaja's son, Jaisingh Rao.

BERNARD SHAW IN IRELAND.

In a letter addressed by George Bernard Shaw to the London Times, he states: "Several persons have complimented me on my courage in venturing into the South of Ireland for my summer holiday. These people feel safer in the friendly atmosphere of Poincaré's France, or in the land of the bottomless mark chutes, where merchants claim up their typewriters with Krupp chains overnight, only to miss them, chains and all, in the morning. They are not afraid even of being dosed with castor oil in Italy by Anglophobic fascists. But they dare not set foot in Ireland. I admit that there is some excuse for them. The Irish government has just passed a Coercion act which would make Trotsky gasp and which makes the history of Dublin Castle under English rule seem like freedom broadening down from precedent to precedent. It contains a gagging clause, directed specially against the press, and it is a law against robbery under arms, of such savagery that no man's property or person is safe.

"The truth is that Cork and Kerry are much safer in respect of both person and property, than the administrative county of London. A year ago no owner of a bicycle in Ireland visited riding out of call of a barrack, as it was sure to be stolen 'under arms', and even the cheapest motor-cars were hidden more carefully than illicit stills. I have not only Ford's but Vauxhall 38's and Crossley 25's career over the mountain roads as carelessly as over the Surrey hills. Let me say, let's heart is in his mouth when he first crosses a repaired bridge on a road for the repairs are extremely unconvincing to the eye; but after crossing two or three in safety he thinks no more of them. Since I arrived I have wandered every night over the mountains, either alone or with a harnessed companion or two, without molestation or indignity.

Naturally there is plenty of room in the hotels, and the quality of the potatoes, the butter, and the milk is such as to make one feel that one can never eat the English substitute can never eat the English substitute again. In short, there is not the smallest reason why Glenariff and Parkinella should not be crowded with year with refugees to the beautiful scenery and in air which makes breathing a luxury. However, the dock strike must be resolved, and the passengers must be unloaded the ship and must, therefore leave Saratoga trunks behind. It is hard on the dockers to have to look on idly whilst potential employers whose rate of pay varies from twelve to thirty shillings an hour handle their own luggage and evidently enjoy it for once in a way as a holiday lark; but it need not hinder the passenger traffic from Paddington to Cork via Fishguard."

"Perhaps I should explain that though the Coercion act empowers every superintendent of police or army captain to seize any man's property, even to his clothes, leaving nothing on him but the onus of proving that he ever possessed them or had any right to possess them, this power (in force for one year only) is not exercised at the expense of the ever-ready Englishman, and plundered houses have to be redistributed by rough-and-ready methods for which the permanent law is too slow and contentious. Ireland is at present in a reaction, and the hands of its government reinforced by extraordinary temporary measures, and is, therefore, at this moment, really the safest country in the world for visitors."

JURY'S FINDING IN CASE OF BOY WHO TOUCHED LIVE WIRE

The coroner's jury inquiring into the death of Gregory Hammond at Padenoc has delivered the following verdict: "We find that Gregory Hammond died at the parish of Westfield about 4.15 o'clock on Wednesday, 22nd, and that he came to his death by coming in contact with a broken live wire, the property of the N. B. Hydro Commission on the road leading to Epworth Park.

"We would recommend that the poles of the hydro be more solidly placed in the ground. We further recommend that steps be taken to prevent hydro poles being used as anchors in road construction or other work and that placards warning of danger be placed at intervals along the highways traversed by the hydro lines."

David W. McKenzie of Nerepis was coroner, assisted by L. McRitchie, I. P. D. Lewin represented the N. B. Electric Power Commission and C. R. Mercereau the Hammond family. The jurors were: Robert McConnell (foreman); B. Calvin, Charles W. Whitting, Hartley Henderson, James H. Hayter, Evan H. Fitzgerald, Charles B. Stevens.

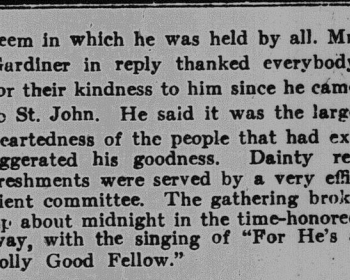
