

TALK UNION WITH EAST ST. JOHN

City Commissioners Take It Up—Grant of \$500 for Japanese.

A recommendation to Council that \$500 be voted toward the Japanese Relief Fund was passed unanimously at a committee meeting of the city commissioners this morning.

On Japanese relief the Mayor said the amount raised was less than he had expected. He agreed to bring in a recommendation at a later meeting.

Commissioner Bullock, Wigmore and Thornton expressed themselves in favor of a contribution of \$500 at least. Dr. Frink said a grant of \$1,000 could hardly be considered too great.

Commissioner Wigmore recommended that a nine inch sewer, 420 feet long, be laid in St. John street, West, at an estimated cost of \$2,800, to be paid for by bond issue.

MISTOOK POLICEMAN FOR SHOP KEEPER. Five Thugs Stage Attack and Three of Them Are Arrested. New York, Oct. 2.—Five guileless thugs mistook Police Captain John McCarthy, of the West 122d Street station, for a defenceless shopkeeper when they saw him in plain clothes late Saturday night talking to the proprietors of the French Fur Shop, 68

West 122d Street, on the sidewalk in front of the store. Jostling him aside for attention later, they pounced on Monte and Joseph Schwartz, the two furriers, beating the former almost unconscious and tearing at the latter's clothes in a frantic effort to get his watch, which was the most obvious loot in sight.

A second later the captain collared one of Monte's assailants and held fast against a rather dazed attack from the other. Meanwhile Joseph Schwartz, cheered by the change in his fortunes, got a grip on one of the men struggling for his watch.

The three footloose bandits fled through the gathering crowd. Two escaped in Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg. Patrolman Frank Adams, on duty at the nearest corner. The prisoners were held in \$10,000 bail each after their arraignment in Harlem Court yesterday morning, charged with felonious assault. They said they were Eugene J. Samack, of 38 East Passaic Avenue, Jersey City; William Lacey, of 418 East 18th street, and Walter Johnson, of 362 Cypress Avenue, the Bronx.

Just before the assault the furriers were talking to Captain McCarthy about a \$3,000 robbery at their shop Thursday night. The police have not been able to link the prisoners in court yesterday with the earlier crime.
