



CARNATION DIVINITY FUDGE.—1/2 cup water, 1 tsp. vanilla, 2 cups brown sugar; 1/16 tsp. cream of tartar, 1 cup nuts, 2 tbsp. butter, 1/4 tsp. orange peel, 1/4 cup Carnation Milk.
