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Will Stage Big Fight But It Was All Off For While Last Night

Stormy Time Over Finances But Kearns Finally Agrees To Get His Last \$100,000 From The Gate Receipts—Battle At 3 O'clock Tomorrow.

(Canadian Press.) Great Falls, Mont., July 3.—The Jack Dempsey-Tom Gibbons heavy-weight championship fight, suddenly called off last night, was put back to its original date and will be decided at Shelby tomorrow as scheduled.

The fight was actually declared off at 12:30 o'clock this morning after an angry argument between Kearns and George Stanton, a local banker.

Stanton advised that it was too late to consider any proposition and that the fight was off.

Some of the newspaper correspondents said that the fight was off because of a dispute over the gate receipts.

Major Lane, who was asleep at another hotel, was awakened and informed that there would be no fight.

Kearns was obstinate to the last, insisting that he had a perfectly legal contract which called for the payment of \$200,000 before Dempsey stepped into the ring.

Shelby, Mont., July 3.—Filled to overflowing with fans, the arena for the Dempsey-Gibbons fight was a scene of confusion and excitement.

The fight was postponed because of a dispute over the gate receipts.

BRITAIN MAY ACT INDEPENDENTLY

Much Depends on Answer from Paris Cabinet May Meet on Reparations Question—Belgium May Protest to the Vatican Re Recent Papal Letter—More Seizures.

(Canadian Press.) London, July 3.—French reports of independent British action for a reparations settlement with Germany were characterized as premature, it is alleged that they are not wholly correct, and should the French reply to the British questionnaire asking for an outline of the French policy not form a basis for negotiations, the cabinet is likely to be called for immediate consideration of independent action.

Brussels, July 3.—The Belgian Government is said to intend to protest to the Vatican re the Belgian cabinet's recent papal letter bearing on the reparations question and Ruhl occupation.

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Berlin, July 3.—French troops recently occupied the Wiesbaden branch of the Reichsbahn and conducted a considerable amount of cash, says the Vossische Zeitung.

Paris, July 3.—By the end of the present year France will have advanced 11,250,000,000 francs in behalf of Germany for reparations.
