

## KING'S DAUGHTERS' ANNUAL MEETING

Mrs. H. W. Robertson Chosen President Last Evening—Reports for Year Show Excellent Results.

The St. John branch and city union of the King's Daughters held its thirty-first annual meeting at the guild last evening and heard splendid reports of a successful year. Mrs. W. H. Robertson was elected president for the coming year, and hearty appreciation of the work of the retiring president, Mrs. A. Clark, was expressed. A handsome check for the mantle-piece was presented at the guild sitting-room by the In-His-Name circle, through its secretary, Mrs. R. C. Thomas, commemorating the third anniversary of the circle. The sum of \$200 was voted to the Farraline Home in Fredericton.

Mrs. W. H. Nice, as secretary, reported on the work of the order in the year when a new committee, the friendship committee, had been formed in the interest of the girls at the guild, and the time limit for the girls' residence at the guild had been decided upon. Mrs. Flower had been appointed matron, and her efficiency and kindly acts were highly praised. The Farraline Home, in Fredericton, in which the order was specially interested, had been relieved of much of its indebtedness during the year. For local needs money had been raised by a rummage sale, the pageant Queen Esther and a St. Patrick's tea and sale. During the year the order had assisted at the Protestant orphans' fair, the child welfare section of the exhibition and aided on tag days for Poppy Day, the Salvation Army and the Free Kindergarten. Eight new members were elected.

Mrs. John Foster, for the house committee, reported thirty-one permanent and forty-five transient boarders during the year and told of the Christmas treat and gifts received as well as repairs to the building. Mrs. F. A. McFadden reported as corresponding secretary. Mrs. George Dishart presented the treasurer's statement showing total receipts of \$4,277.91 and a balance of \$45.34, besides \$157.21 in the title fund. Mrs. R. A. McLaughlin gave the hospital committee report, telling of regular visits to the East St. John Hospital and the Home for Incubables. Miss Laura McLaughlin gave the spiritual committee report, telling of special services held. Mrs. D. W. Puddington, for the Travelers' Aid committee, reported on meeting arrivals from overseas.

## FINES IMPOSED IN MOTOR-CAR CASES

Two men, charged with being drunk and disorderly while operating an automobile in the Rothessy road last week, appeared before Magistrate Allingham in Fairville yesterday. One was fined \$20 and costs, amounting in all to \$30, and the other fined \$5 and costs, totaling \$10. A chauffeur and two others in the same case did not appear and writs were issued for them. As a result of

the evidence in this case two charges will be laid under the liquor act. In the same court yesterday two drivers were fined \$8 and costs each for operating their cars in the Golden Grove road. A case against a car owner, in which the information was laid by the road supervisor, was dropped when it was found that the motorist was a minister. A fine of \$8 was permitted to stand against a driver for operating his car in the Loch Monod road. Three other cases, involving operation of cars in the Westfield and Golden Grove roads, were adjourned until Saturday. The owner of a heavy car operating in the Manawagonish road, was reported last night.
