

**GOING TO PALESTINE**  
 Lt. E. S. Raby, who has been attached to this district as officer of supplies, has been struck off the strength of military district No. 7. He is joining the imperial army service corps and will go to Palestine for service. Lieutenant and Mrs. Raby have booked passage to England on the S. Saturnia, which is expected to sail on April 17. Lieutenant Raby was, last summer, in the Serbian force at Sussex, and later was in Valenciennes and prior to that time had served in France. Both Lieutenant and Mrs. Raby were very well known in St. John and they will be missed by a large circle of friends.

**INQUIRY IS ENDED.**  
 The court of inquiry which was being held in connection with certain army accounts, was ended today. A large number of witnesses have been examined. Brigadier-General Cruikshank, chairman of the court; Brigadier-General Helmer, Lt.-Col. Barnes, Lt.-Col. LePan, Colonel F. H. Deacon and Major Spry of militia headquarters, Ottawa, who have been holding the court, will return to Ottawa to make their findings. According to military law nothing official in a matter of this kind is allowed to be made public, but it is probable that an announcement will be made later. Brigadier-General Macdonnell, Major Wilmore and Major Knowlton of local headquarters, assisted in the court of inquiry.

**ADAM J. CHARLTON DEAD**  
 Prominent as Decorative Painter and in Amateur Theatricals

Adam J. Charlton died at his home, 45 St. David street, this morning, following periods of illness during some three years. Mr. Charlton was a widely known citizen, respected by a large circle of friends and well liked by all whom he met. He was prominent in many ways as an artistic designer and fancy painter and on occasions of official visits to the city and other public functions calling for display and decorations, Mr. Charlton carried out much of the work. On the visit of the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York the large arches in King street and King Square were his handwork and came in for much commendation. Pictures of the arches were published in various periodicals.  
 Mr. Charlton was also active and popular in amateur theatricals and besides playing characters, promoted several local productions with much success. His death will be widely mourned in the city and much sympathy will be extended to his bereaved wife and son, William A., clerk in the local harbor master's office.  
 The funeral arrangements have been made for Monday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock, standard time.
