### LOCAL NEWS

**SOLDIERS FOR HERE**  
The S. S. Legland expected at Halifax today has live officer and eighty-one other ranks on board for Military District No. 7.

**REMEMBERED HIS ALMA MATER**  
Prof. Egerton R. M. Brecken, of West China University, who graduated at Mount Allison in 1901, has sent \$500 to the library fund of the Sackville Institution.

**HAS NOT IMPROVED**  
The friends of Policeman James H. Gossie who has been confined to his bed for more than three months will be sorry to hear that his condition is unchanging.

**NEWS OF MOTHER'S DEATH**  
Mrs. Hazen Brown of Torriburn has received news of the death of her mother, Mrs. Charles Skinner, aged seventy-five years, which occurred at her home in Colton, Ill., on June 1.

**FROM WEST INDIES**  
The S. S. Champlain is expected to arrive in St. John tomorrow morning from the West Indies, with six officers and fifty-three other ranks on board, from St. Lucia. The men have been doing garrison duty there.

**SUNDAY DRINKING**  
A letter to the Times complains of much Sunday drinking just beyond March Bridge to the corner of Frederick street, and annoyance of people on their way to church. Complaint is especially made about the last two Sundays.

**MILITARY EXAMINATIONS**  
The entrance examinations for the Royal Military College, Kingston, Ontario, are being written today at local military headquarters with Major C. D. Knowlton in charge. There are three candidates writing the papers, two from Robesay and one from St. Stephen.

**DEATH OF CHILD**  
Mr. and Mrs. William, district medical health officer for the southern district, will leave this evening for Gagetown to preside over a meeting of the Health County sub-district Board of Health tomorrow. The chief business will be the appointment of medical inspectors of schools.

**ROBESAY PROPERTY WITHDRAWN**  
The property in Robesay Park known as The Chalet, consisting of a summer residence and six lots of land formerly owned by Lady Tiler, was offered for sale by auction on behalf of H. B. Robinson at Chubb's Corner at noon on Saturday by R. L. Potts. It was withdrawn at \$2,800.

**WANT OFFICER IN SIMONS**  
The people of Simons, both in East St. John and out toward Brookville want police protection. For the last two months, it is said, conditions have been bad and women do not like to go out alone in the evening. Officer Saunders formerly looked that district, and there is a demand for the appointment of a vigorous man to continue the work. A public meeting will be held to discuss the matter and call for action by the authorities.

**ARRIVED TODAY**  
Among those arriving in the city on the Boston train today was Dr. A. P. Gorham, son of George Gorham of North End, who came from New York to take up his duties as director of elementary agricultural education for New Brunswick. Dr. Gorham was unable to say anything with regard to the office or the work to be done, as he had just reported the position and had not yet returned to the government department. He went through to Sussex this afternoon.

**THE FISH TRADE**  
The Canadian Trade Commission, Ottawa, has been very active in securing prospective markets for our fish products. Two bulletins on the subject have just been received by the board of trade. The secretary says he will be glad to show them to interested people. The Canadian representative of a New York trading corporation writes for particulars respecting the packing of salt codfish and similar products. He says he is coming to St. John soon in the hope of promoting further business relations with our merchants.

**DEATH OF THOMAS G. JENKINS**  
Many friends in the city will be grieved to learn of the death of Thomas G. Jenkins which occurred this morning at the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Jenkins, 22 Elliott Row. He was a bright, popular young man and much sympathy will be felt for the bereaved. Mr. Jenkins had been in poor health for the last few months. He was a member of the Knights of Columbus and the Y. M. C. L. Besides his parents he is survived by one sister, Miss Josephine, and one brother, Noel. The funeral will be held on Wednesday morning from his parents' residence.

**MISSIONS**  
A mission conducted by Redeptionist fathers in the Church of the Assumption, west side, was closed last evening with rosary and a sermon by Rev. Joseph Le McLaughlin, C. S. S. R. After the sermon which was on "Perseverance" Father McLaughlin thanked the congregation for their faithful attendance during the week and expressed gratification at the large number of people who had approached the Sacraments, delivered an excellent sermon on the Holy-Eucharist.
