### War Garden Bulletin

PRACTICAL DAILY GUIDE FOR VACANT LOT AND BACK-YARD GARDENERS ENLISTED IN GREAT-ER PRODUCTION CAMPAIGN

### CELERY TRENCHES

Now that the potatoes are safely in the ground the next move to be considered is the preparation of the celery trenches. A good many amateur gardeners shy at this vegetable, thinking it too troublesome to handle but those who go in for it usually feel that their labor has been well repaid before the season is out. To prepare the trenches, set a line the length desired. Mark along this line with a spade and move the line fifteen inches. Mark this also. Dig out the space between the lines to a depth of nine inches, piling the soil on either side of the trench. If more than one row is required, the space between should be not less than three feet. This space can be utilized for the growing of lettuce, cauliflower, radishes or other early crops that it will be possible to clear off before the celery is ready for earthing. Put some manure in the trenches and dig in. The celery trenches should be left for some days before the plants are put in. The day before planting they should be flooded with water. A very important factor in the successful culture of this popular vegetable is a plentiful supply of water. In its wild state the celery is a bog plant and it is, therefore, naturally a water lover.

### RECENT DEATHS

Rev. Thomas Trotter, D. D., LL. D., professor of homiletics and pastoral theology at McMaster University and for ten years president of Acadia University, is announced in Toronto. He had been in ill health a long time.

He was born in Leicestershire, England, on Aug. 11, 1853. In 1870 he removed to Canada with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. S. Edwin Trotter. He was educated at Woodstock College, Toronto; Toronto University, McMaster University and Queens University. McMaster University and Queens conferred the degree of Doctor of Divinity upon him and Queens, Dalhousie and Acadia the degree of Doctor of Laws.

He was pastor of the Baptist church at Woodstock, Ont., from 1875 to 1889, and of the Broad street Baptist church, Toronto, from 1889 to 1890, when he became professor of homiletics and pastoral theology at McMaster University. He resigned in 1895 and the following year became president of Acadia. During his ten years' incumbency there he became widely acquainted with the Baptists of the maritime provinces and the eastern states. He was eloquent, forceful and popular as a speaker and broad-minded and sympathetic as a man. When he resigned as president of Acadia in 1900 he became pastor of the Ashtabuck Baptist church, Toledo, O., remaining there until 1909, when he resumed his old chair at McMaster.

In 1887 he married Miss Maud Freeman, daughter of Rev. David Freeman of Canby. She had been principal of the ladies' department of Woodstock College.

Rev. Dr. George B. Catten, president of Acadia, says of the late Rev. Dr. Trotter: "The Baptists of the maritime provinces will feel keenly the death of Dr. Trotter, which occurred in Toronto. He had a very high place in the denomination, and was much beloved by his many friends. He came to Acadia at a time when it seemed that the financial straits of the institution were almost beyond repair, and before leaving raised sufficient funds to pay off all debts and increase the endowment. He was undoubtedly the man for the hour."

R. H. Dean, youngest son of B. H. Dean, 56 Wall street, took place suddenly in Winnipeg last week. He leaves a wife, formerly Miss Hazel T. Gledhill, of Montreal. Besides his father there survive two sisters, Mrs. H. W. Dalton, Renforth, and Mrs. W. H. Turner, St. John, and one brother, William, of Sydney (N. S.). The deceased was in the insurance business. Interment was in Winnipeg.

Mrs. Janet I. Kindred, many friends of Mrs. Janet I. Kindred, will learn with regret of her death which occurred at her home 18 Rodney street, West St. John, after a lingering illness, on Sunday, the 9th inst. She bore her illness with great fortitude and is survived by her husband, John A. Kindred; two sons, J. Alexander and Albert, of West St. John; four brothers, James McGregor, Campbell, John H. Campbell, Malcolm H. Campbell, of West St. John, and George Benjamin Campbell, of Arlington (Mass.); four sisters, Mrs. Catherine Steele and Mrs. John McBride, of St. John; Mrs. E. O. Jones, West St. John, and Mrs. James B. Reid, of Arlington (Mass.); one niece, Mrs. T. N. Mott, of West St. John, and eight grandchildren. The funeral will be held on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock from her late residence.

### NOT NECESSARY TO RESIDE IN CANADA

Separation Allowance to Soldiers' Wives Wherever Located—News of the Soldiers

Orders have been received from Ottawa to the effect that a decision had been reached extending the payment of separation allowances to dependents not living in Canada. Hitherto such separation allowances have been paid only to relatives of soldiers actually living in Canada.

Lieutenant G. H. Currie, who has been recruiting officer in New Brunswick for the Canadian Engineers, railway construction and skilled railway employees' corps, has been given additional duties, and is now the recruiting officer for the maritime provinces.

Captain Kenneth Marr, son of Archie C. Marr, a former resident of Barton, Digby County, N. S., has won distinction with the flying corps of the United States army. He brought down a enemy monoplane.

### Casualties

Mrs. J. G. Kirkpatrick of Grand Falls, N. B., has advised yesterday that her son, Gunner Harry Pike, M. M., had been admitted to a hospital in Boulogne, France, on June 2, suffering from gas burns. Gunner Pike is a South African war veteran. He went overseas with the 1st Canadian Trench Battalion. The names of six New Brunswick men appear in the midnight casualty list.

### MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

The Deutsche Tage Zeitung of Berlin reports that there will be a unity of military command in Germany, Austria, Bulgaria and Turkey.

An American steamer Pinar Del Rio was sunk seventy miles off the coast of Maryland Saturday morning by a German submarine. The captain and fourteen of his crew are missing.

Rev. J. Stanley Dwyer of Brockton, Mass., has accepted the presidency of Howard University, Washington, D. C. He was born in Carleton.

The Winnipeg Telegram building was badly damaged by fire Sunday morning and the printing department burned out. The loss is about \$150,000. The newspaper will be published elsewhere until repairs are made.

The Marline Linen Mills, Limited, has been incorporated with head offices in Moncton and capital stock of \$250,000, to take over the plant and business of the Eastern Linen Mills, Limited, formerly of Dorchester and more recently of Moncton.

A resolution calling on the church to affirm its conviction that religious education should form part of the educational systems of the provinces, that the co-operation of other denominations should be sought and that the ministers of education should be constituted with, was presented to the Presbyterian General Assembly on Sunday. The resolution will be dealt with later.

The N. B. and P. E. I. Methodist Conference has opened its sessions in Sackville. The ministers' conference continues until Wednesday and the general conference opens on Thursday.

A new star, the brightest discovered since 1845, was detected last night at Leander McCormick observatory at the University of Virginia, by C. T. Oliver, professor of astronomy. He described it as a bright blue star, of magnitude 0.5 degrees, located in the constellation Aquila, a star that makes it nearly the largest and brightest in the sky during the present month.

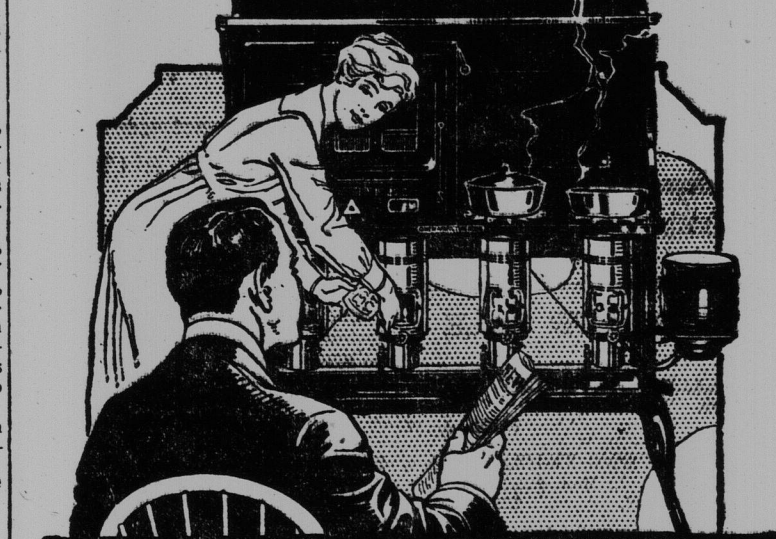
A draft of 100 men from No. 9 Siege battery left for other training quarters on Saturday night.
