BASEBALL
Court Protects Umpire.

Chicago, Feb. 8.—It is illegal to strike a baseball umpire in Illinois. The view was held by the appellate court yesterday in sustaining a decision of the municipal court rendered on November 21, 1908, by which Robert Cantwell was fined \$75 and costs for assaulting Umpire Kertin, of the American League.

Chance's Plans.
Frank Chance has already made up his mind how he will line up the players in the first practice game in Bermuda in March. He believes that he has a pretty fair line on the material.

Chance will divide the twenty-eight players into two teams, regulars and recruits, and the latter will be in the care of Archie Irwin. After the men have exercised for the first four or five days the two teams will play three practice games a day, the regulars against the recruits.

Chance intends to cover first base for the regulars in Bermuda, with the idea of finding out whether he can stand the strain of a championship campaign.

Chance will be helped at second base at his own request, and Hartzell will cover third, because he has had more experience at that place than any other eligible. But this does not mean that Chase and Hartzell will be permanent fixtures at the two bases. Chance simply wants to experiment with them, at the same time trying out himself at the first corner.
