WOULD FORTIFY CANADA'S PORTS Berden Government Plans Substitute For Naval Defence to Suit Nationalists

Ottawa, July 8.—Although the Railway and the political exigencies of Halifax are being practically put out of commission and their crews discharged, the government is going ahead with a naval defence policy "on land".

The headquarters naval staff is being retained here and the naval college at Halifax is still working. This is quite satisfactory to the Nationalists.

Another safe step which will not interfere with the political exigencies of the "Unholy Alliance" is to be taken soon. The government plans to greatly strengthen the defences of the imperial naval bases at Esquimaux and Halifax, and to protect with land defences the Canadian strategic ports of St. John, Sydney and Vancouver.

It is understood that General Sir Ian Hamilton's mission to Canada includes an inspecting party will look over the defences at Halifax and will also study the problem of coast defence works at Sydney and St. John.

CARPENTERS WANT COCHRANE PUT OUT OF BORDEN CABINET

Here is Text of Resolution of Conference Representing 2,000 Men

For the information of a Conservative reader who questions the accuracy of the statement that the Brotherhood of Carpenters in provincial convention at Brantford, Ontario, demanded from Mr. Borden the resignation of the present minister of railways and canals, publishes the exact terms of the resolution which was adopted. At the provincial conference of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters & Joiners of America, held at Brantford, Ontario, on June 30th, the following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas the efforts of our organization having so far proved ineffective in saving the wages of the government employes in the gate yards of the Welland Canal raised to the standard of the district;

"And whereas the same reflects upon the honesty of the dominion government, who prefer to enforce their wage conditions on all work and supplies;

"Be it resolved, that we, the Ontario Provincial Conference, assembled at Brantford, representing over 2,000 carpenters, call upon the premier to remove from his position the Hon. Frank Cochrane, and appoint a man as minister of railways and canals who will act in harmony with this policy of the government and in sympathy with the workmen;

"And that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the premier and to the press."

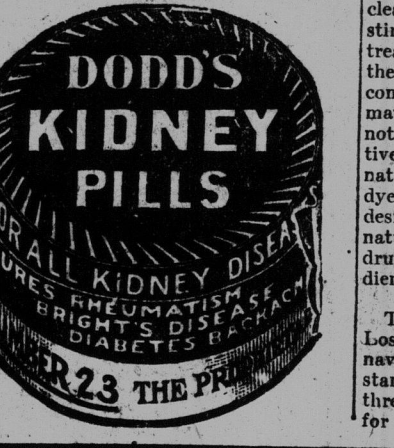
