**WILL OF H. D. TROOP IN PROBATE COURT TODAY**

All Trustees And One Witness Dead—Case of Rochester vs. Agar

In the Probate Court today, the matter of the estate of Howard D. Troop, ship merchant, came up. He left a will dated June 1, 1882. One of the witnesses, George W. Allen, barrister-at-law, is dead; the other, W. H. Taylor, resides in California. On proof of these facts and the signatures of the parties, the will was admitted to probate. The will appoints his wife, Mary Ann Troop, John E. Irvine and A. Chipman Smith, executors and trustees. After making provision for his wife, his mother Katherine, and his sister Annie A. Troop, all of whom died before him, he directs that on their death the estate shall be divided, to each of his children being males two equal shares, and to each of his children being females, one equal share. He left two daughters, Nellie Gertrude, wife of Dr. Walter M. White, and Josephine Smith, wife of Charles E. MacPherson, and one son, Charles McLaughlin Troop, of British Columbia. All the trustees having died, the testator, the son and daughter renounced and asked for the appointment of J. Roy Campbell, of St. John, barrister, as administrator with the will annexed. He was accordingly sworn in as such. Real estate consists of Mr. Troop's residence on the south side of Orange street, and personal estate \$4,000. Barnhill, Dwing & Sanford are executors.

The will of John Frederick Estabrook, merchant, was proved. He gives to each of his four sons, Abraham, James, William George, Henry Spurgeon and Ralph Waldo, and his two daughters, Annabel, wife of John R. Cowan, and Margaret Watson, wife of Joseph W. McAlary, all of St. John, the sum of \$100 each, the rest of his estate to his wife for life, and on her death to be divided equally among his sons and daughters, and he nominates wife and two sons, William George and Ralph Waldo, executors. They were sworn in as such. There is no real estate; personal estate, consisting of money on deposit in banks, \$8,000. L. P. D. Riley is proctor.

**Rochester vs. Agar.**  
Hearing of the evidence in the non-jury civil case of Richmond Rochester vs. M. E. Agar, was concluded before Mr. Justice Landry in the circuit court this morning. The plaintiff and John Connor were the witnesses examined at today's session. Hearing of the argument was set for next Friday morning. Fred R. Taylor is for the plaintiff and Recorder Baxter, K. C., for the defendant.

The court adjourned until next Thursday morning, when another civil case will be tried.

**DEFINITE NAMING OF THE DATE SOON**

Norton Griffiths & Co. Manager In The City Today

The plans of Norton Griffiths & Co. for commencing their big contract at Courtenay Bay are now about complete, and a more definite announcement of the date of starting will be made very soon, according to W. Burton Stewart, general manager of the company, who arrived in the city today.

Mr. Stewart was accompanied by P. R. Warren, chief engineer of the company, and also by L. E. Brantford, of London, a member of the British company, who has been through to Vancouver to inspect the work which is being carried on there by Norton Griffiths & Co. Mr. Stewart will leave again tomorrow evening for Victoria, where he will call on New York on the S.S. Lusitania for England next week. He expects to return in June and expects Mr. Griffiths to follow in July.

Speaking of the progress of the work here, Mr. Stewart said this morning that while there has been some trouble from the difficulty in deciding the location of the breakwater. He believes that the announcement that the date will be original one near the Municipal Home is correct, but said that this was a disappointment to him.

**TODAY'S POLICE COURT**

In the police court this morning Allan Keefe and Serva Kidson, given in charge by Chief Officer Reed of the S.S. Stanley, on charge of fighting and acting disorderly on board the steamer last night, fined \$20 or six months in jail each. The fine was allowed to stand against Nelson as, according to the evidence, he was not so much in fault as Keefe.

Ralph Coogrove, charged with wandering about in Paradise row last night and giving a satisfactory account of himself, was remanded.

One other prisoner, charged with drunkenness, was fined \$8 or two months in jail.

Eight prisoners who were in jail on remand were brought into court and dealt with. James A. Wilcox, arrested on charge of obtaining money under false pretence from Thomas A. Reynolds, manager of the Royal Hotel, was further remanded. He had begun to pay the fine of \$20 on Monday morning at ten o'clock. Frederick McDowell, arrested on suspicion of stealing \$7 worth of butter from T. A. Robinson, was also further remanded. Other prisoners charged with drunkenness were fined \$8 or two months in jail.

One of them, John Beattay, who was the star witness in the case against James Miller, charged with selling liquor illegally, got off with an \$8 fine. He was told by the court that he might have to appear again and answer to a charge of perjury in connection with the evidence given by him in the Miller case.

**DEAD AT AGE OF 94**

Moving From St. John to Bangor, Patrick Fallon Walked Whole Way

The death of Patrick Fallon, one of Bangor's oldest residents, occurred at his home there yesterday at the age of ninety-four years. Death was due to old age. Mr. Fallon was born in Loughlinne, County Galway, Ireland, and landed in St. John seventy years ago. He made his way from this city to Bangor on foot through the wilderness. He has been a section man on the European & North American railroad, and later on the Maine Central, for years and was highly respected by all who knew him. He was a constant attendant at St. John's Catholic church. Besides his wife, Mr. Fallon leaves six sons, Michael, James, Martin, John and Thomas, of Bangor, and Joseph of New York city. He also leaves two daughters, Miss Kate Fallon of Bangor and Miss Nora Fallon of New York city.
