**MARITIME TRADE BOARD**  
Annual Meeting in Truro in August—The Present Optimism

The eighteenth annual meeting of the Maritime Board of Trade will be held in Truro, N. S., on Wednesday, August 21. Notices have been sent out to the local boards with invitations to send in a list of the subjects which they wished discussed. A resolution adopted last year rules out any subject of local character or which is opposed to the interests of other boards, and any subject may be objected to in advance by any board.

The circular address—  
"The resources and potentialities of the maritime provinces are becoming better known; the interest of capitalists is being enlisted in the development of their native wealth; the older industries are expanding, and new ones are being added; a spirit of optimism is abroad, and the feeling prevails that these eastern provinces are at last coming into their own; therefore the attendance and interest displayed at the forthcoming meeting at Truro should be commensurate with the large issues at stake."  
The present officers of the maritime board are:—Dr. W. R. Dunbar, Truro, N. S., president; Jas. Paton, Charlottetown, P.E.I., first vice-president; E. A. McCurdy, New Brunswick, second vice-president; Thos. Williams, Moncton, N. B., secretary-treasurer.

Fredericton, N. B., June 18.—Dr. E. B. Fisher, secretary of the provincial board of health for years, has decided to remove to Texas to practice his profession. The board of health in York are going about promising to have the old government house repaired and made the official residence of the health officer in case Fleming is returned to power. This house is intended only for use in York. Monday's Standard stated that no opposition meetings had been held in York up to that time. The same issue of the Telegram contained reports of a successful meeting held at Kingslear on Friday night.

R. A. Eady, who went to Kingston two years ago, is to return to Fredericton next week to reside. An auto containing Provincial Secretary H. F. McLeod and other Tory spellbinders, frightened a horse belonging to Isaac G. Kingslear in Government Lane yesterday and the wagon was overturned and broken. Good escaped unhurt.

At a government meeting in Prince William last night a gang of Tory heelers from Nashville, supposed to be working on the Valley Railway, attempted to break up the proceedings. Being unsuccessful, one threw a missile which struck W. J. Osborne, a Liberal candidate, who was delivering an address. The incident has aroused great indignation.

**THE GERMAIN STREET REPAIRS ARE BEGUN**  
The much needed repairs to the pavement in Germain street have been commenced. The block between Queen and Duke streets has been closed to traffic and the men were put to work on the job this morning. The pavement was laid by the Hasseyon Paving Company in the fall of 1910, and there has been complaint about it. The concrete curbing and gutters have cracked and chipped in many places, and the asphalt paving shows a large number of depressions and holes.

The common council decided some time ago to forfeit the balance of the contract money still held by the city and to make the repairs, which will include an entire new asphalt surface. If the cost exceeds the amount held back from the contractor, the guarantee company which backed their contract will be called upon to pay up the difference.

"Resolved, that no employees of the city shall absent themselves from duty to actively participate in election work and any violation of this rule or order entails suspension or dismissal from office."  
The commissioners recognise the right of civic officials to do as they please outside of working hours but the rule will prevent any friction which might be caused by allowing any of the employees to take time off for politics.
