THE EARLY LIFE OF LLOYD GEORGE

First Part of British Writer's Biography of Chancellor of Exchequer is Published—His Qualities in Young Manhood

Herbert de Paro is writing a biography of Lloyd George in four volumes. The first, dealing with his early life is published. Though born at Manchester in 1863, his father, a man with ideas in advance of his time had been a schoolmaster successively in Liverpool and Manchester—Mr. Lloyd George comes from a second and sturdy yeoman stock which has its roots deep down in the soil of Pembrokeshire. Like Mr. Asquith, he lost his father when a child. Thereafter his mother made her home with Richard Lloyd, her bachelor brother, in their ancestral village of Llanystrumdy, in Carnarvonshire, where Mr. Lloyd was a master shoemaker. In his humble home, a sequestered corner of Wales, not far from the romantic region of Snowdonia, the future statesman spent his childhood. All the schooling he got was that which he obtained in the Church of England elementary school, the only available school in the village. At Llanystrumdy school, as in most other church schools in rural Wales, the majority of the children were Nonconformists. The meager education of this primary school was supplemented by an invaluable home training.

Simple Home Training
Simple as was the cottage in which David Lloyd George lived, modest as were all his appointments, life in it was sweet and healthful. The household, one of intelligence and refinement, was encompassed with an atmosphere serene and high. It was a household where piety was instinctive, and where life was regarded as a precious privilege, a high destiny, and a solemn trust. Richard Lloyd, now a veteran marching stoutly towards the eighth decade in a man whose physical strength of character is adorned by tender strength and affectionate contact with this fine personality must have had a powerful influence in forming the character and shaping the facts of a bright and gifted lad. From his childhood the future statesman was reared in the stimulating atmosphere of Liberal ideas. His father, who had David Lloyd George—"ever a fighter"—was the verdict of his youthful contemporaries—along himself with ardor at the first opportunity into the championship of temperance, non-conformity and popular rights. These causes, which he had learned on his own hearthstone to revere as sacred.

A Village Hampden
The high-spirited lad was in his way a village Hampden, and on more than one occasion he organized his school fellows to resist what he regarded as the encroachments of the church on the rights of conscience. Later when he became a solicitor, he threw himself heart and soul into the cause of the poor, and was regarded as a champion of the oppressed, and he was eager to champion his victims; in fact, whether as a nonconformist, to a preacher, or to any humble worker, standing him like a personal blow.

Political Ambitions Awoke Early in Mr. Lloyd George's heart. He paid his first visit to London in 1881, then a youth of eighteen.

Solicitor at 21
He qualified as a solicitor when he was twenty-one, passing the final examination with honor. At once he blossomed forth as a London Daily Chronicle.

Future Colleagues
In these early years in the house of commons, Lloyd George used to write a pamphlet in Wales to the General (The Nation), published at Carnarvon. From these contributions the following extract is taken: "Mr. Asquith, the home secretary is a short, thick-set, rather round-shouldered man with a face as clean shaven as that of the most advanced curate, keen eyes, and a broad intellectual forehead. He is the hope of the rising generation of Radicals. He is only a few years over forty, and by the dying wish of a peer of the last generation, he has already won a prominent position as a nonconformist, being descended from a family of Yorkshire independents. He is more effective as a parliamentary debater. He speaks clearly and with great force, and his arguments with great brilliancy. He is considered, upon the whole, as the ablest of the cabinet in that of 1890-92."

An unwavering friend of the Nationalist movement, Lloyd George was on the outside of his parliamentary career on excellent terms with the Irish members. He cherished in particular a warm affection for the noble Irish patriot, Michael Davitt. It will be seen from what has been written that this first volume of Lloyd George's biography is of surpassing interest. It has selected the appetite for the second volume, which is to deal with the part he played during the South African war.
