THE EARLY LIFE OF LLOYD GEORGE

**First Part of British Writer's Biography of Chancellor of Exchequer is Published—His Qualities in Young Manhood**

Herbert du Parcq is writing a biography of Lloyd George in four volumes. The first, dealing with his early life is published. Though born at Manchester in 1863, of his time, had been a schoolmaster successively in Liverpool and Manchester—Mr. Lloyd George comes from a second and sturdy yeoman stock which has its roots deep down in the soil of Pembrokeshire. Like Mr. Asquith he lost his father when a child. Thereafter his mother made her home with Richard Lloyd, her bachelor brother, in their ancestral village of Llanystumdwy, in Carnarvonshire, where Mr. Lloyd was a master shoemaker. In his humble home in a sequestered corner of Wales, not far from the romantic region of Snowdonia, the future statesman spent his boyhood. All the schooling he got was that which he obtained in the Church of England elementary school, the only available school in the village. At Llanystumdwy school, as in most other church schools in rural Wales, the majority of the children were Nonconformists. The meager education of this primary school was supplemented by an invaluable home training.

**Simple Home Training**  
Simple as was the cottage in which David Lloyd George lived, modest as were all his appointments, life in it was sweet and healthful. The household, one of intelligence and refinement, was encompassed with an atmosphere serene and high. It was a household where piety was instinctive, and where life was regarded as a precious privilege, a high destiny, and a stern school of discipline. Richard Lloyd, now a veteran marching stoutly towards the eighties, is a man whose strength of character is adorned by tender grace.

**And affectionate contact with this fine personality must have had a powerful influence in forming the character and shaping the future of a bright and gifted man.** From his childhood the future statesman was reared in the stimulating atmosphere of a household with such a father and such a mother. Little wonder that David Lloyd George—"ever a fighter"—was the verdict of his youthful contemporaries—dug himself with ardor at the first opportunity into the championship of temperance, non-conformity and popular education. These causes which he had learned on his own hearth-stone to revere as sacred.

**A Village Hampden**  
The highspirited lad was in his way a village Hampden, and on more than one occasion he organized his school fellows to resist what he regarded as the encroachments of the church on the domain of conscience. Later when he became a solicitor, he threw himself heart and soul into the battle of the disestablishment. The dispute originated in the refusal of a clergyman to officiate at the wedding of a poor old quarryman to be buried with his daughter, because the bereaved wife was a Nonconformist. The battle was won for freedom through Mr. Lloyd George's leadership. Courage had been his characteristic as a youth. It was his note as a rising statesman. His spirit always flamed out against oppression, and he was eager to champion his victims; intuitive, whether to a Nonconformist, to a poet, or to any humble worker, stung him like a personal blow.

**Political ambitions awoke early in Mr. Lloyd George's heart.** He paid his first visit to London in 1881, then a youth of eighteen.

**Solicitor at 21**  
He qualified as a solicitor when he was twenty-one, passing the final examination with honor. At once he blossomed forth.

**Future Colleagues**  
In these early years in the house of commons, Lloyd George used to write a pamphlet for the Welsh to the General (The Nation), published at Carnarvon. From these contributions the following extract was taken: "Mr. Asquith, the home secretary is a short, thickset, rather round-shouldered man with a face as clean shaven as that of the most advanced curate, keen eyes, and a broad intellectual forehead. He is the hope of the rising generation of Radicals. He is only a few years over forty, and yet the world of politics. He is, or at any rate was, a Nonconformist, being descended from a family of Yorkshire Independents. There is only one man in the house who is more effective as a parliamentary debater. He speaks clearly and with great brilliancy and force. It is considered, upon the whole, that he fills the same position in the parliament of 1892 as Mr. Chamberlain in that of 1890-95."

**An unwavering friend of the Nationalist movement, Lloyd George was on the outside of his parliamentary career on excellent terms with the Irish members. He cheerfully in particular a warm affection for the noble Irish patriot, Michael Davitt. It will be seen from what has been written that this first volume of Lloyd George's biography is of surpassing interest. It has selected the appetite for the second volume, which is to deal with the part he played during the South African war.**

**MORNING LOCALS**  
Seven Greeks will leave St. John this evening to return home to take part in the war between Greece and Turkey. This is in response to the first call. If a second call is issued the return of all Greeks will be compulsory on penalty of perpetual banishment or ten years imprisonment if they return afterwards.

**After an inspection of the Sand Point facilities yesterday afternoon the commission decided to have the foundations of warehouse No. 2 strengthened before winter. They visited the Pictorial wharf and decided to have the construction of the molaes platforms proceeded with. Driveways will be left to each door of the warehouse.**

**The Board of Health yesterday dealt with a communication regarding the inspection of dairy cattle. They recommended that the inspector give more time to this work and will confer with the local government regarding the matter. A delegation from the Master Plumbers' Association met the board and discussed the new plumbing regulations soon to go into effect. The New System Laundry was ordered to install a steam pump for sewage.**

**Mark Carey who was to have appeared before Stipendiary Magistrate Ailingham in the Fairville court yesterday afternoon, charged with selling liquor without a license, failed to put in an appearance. One witness for the prosecution was examined and the case was laid over until next Monday when further witnesses will be examined.**

**The quarterly meeting of St. George's Society was held last night in the society's rooms in Charlotte street. Several applications for membership were handed in, and new members were elected. The society met to celebrate Trafalgar day, in the form of a smoker, and a large committee was appointed to make the arrangements.**

**There was a large attendance at the meeting. H. R. McLean, commissioner of public safety, left last evening on a trip to Boston and Springfield to look into some of the latest ideas in connection with the management of police, fire and marine departments.**

**Sheriff Smith of Digby left this morning for Dorchester penitentiary, having in custody a negro named Harris, who was sentenced to serve two years in the institution for theft.**

**John Powers of Union street, drove his horse into a ditch at Haymarket Square last evening and narrowly escaped serious injury. The horse was extricated without being injured.**
