MAINE SENATOR AND LIQUOR LAW

Introduces a Drastic Bill for Confiscation of Vehicles—Fine and Imprisonment of Violators.

Augusta, Feb. 10.—In the Senate Thursday Senator Spencer of York introduced an act to amend the laws relating to intoxicating liquor. The act provides that all automobiles, trucks, wagons, boats or vessels containing intoxicating liquor in the possession or in the control of any person transporting the same without being in possession of a permit heretofore issued under the provisions of the national prohibition act shall be declared forfeited by the court and sold in the same manner as is provided in the sale of vessels containing intoxicating liquors. Any claimant of any such boat or vessel must allege and prove the purpose of the transportation of intoxicating liquors was without his knowledge or consent.

The act further provides that whoever aids in the sale of any intoxicating liquor in this state by acting as agent, broker, employer or messenger for either the buyer or seller shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$100 nor more than \$500 and costs and in addition be imprisoned for not less than six months nor more than two years and in default of payment imprisonment for not less than two or more than six months additional.

The act further provides that any person who shall transport into this state or from place to place any intoxicating liquor in any automobile, truck, wagon, boat, vessel or vehicle shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$500 nor more than \$1,000 and costs and in addition imprisonment for not less than six months nor more than two years and in default of payment imprisonment of six months' additional.
