

After War of Independence by Argentina.

Beunos Ayres, March 12.—(By Mail)
—The whereaboats of an aerolite of great size, which was revealed to the Spanish conquerors by Indians about the middle of the seventeenth century, and of which traces have been lost since the year 1812, have again been ascertained, according to a communication received by Professor Clemente Oneilli, an Argentine naturalist, from a Senor Leberthou, who claims the rediscovery. The aerolite is located in the province of Santiage del Estero, in the uninhabited Ottumpa pampa, which is also known as "Sky Pampa," after the celestial origin of the stone.

Up to the year 1812 the situation of the aerolite was well known, and from the minerals which constitute its mass several flint-lock muskets were made. It was about the middle of the seventeenth century that the Spaniards, guided by the Vilelas Indians, discoverad the great meteoric mass, half buried in the sands. Reports say that a large portion was brought to Buenos Ayres and a part sent to the British Museum.

After the war of independence and the long period of formation of the Argentine nation had passed, several expeditions were sent out to search for the aerolite. Other attempts were made in more recent times, and it was only this year that an attempt made by the authorities of Santiago del Estero province ended in failure.

According to certain analyses alleged to have been made in 1812, the meteorite was constituted of pure



Methodist Educational Board Approves Action of Allison's

(Toronto Globe.) At the third daay's proceedings of the Educational Board of the Methodist Church in Canada, held yesterday in the Wesley Buildings, the members discussed the proposal for the amalgamation of Mount Allison Methodist University, Ladies' College and Academy, of Sackville, N. B., with the proposed Maritime University, to be located at Halifax.

The board decided to endorse the action of the Governors of Allison action of the Governors of Allison University in favoring the amalgamation, on condition that it could be done without prejudice to the finances of Allison. If the arrangement for the union of colleges is consummated, the Methodists will move Allison University to Halifax, but will likely keep the Ladies' College and the Academy College at Sackville. King's College (Anglican), which would be one of the amalgamating colleges, has as its principal Dr. Temple Stannage Boyle, formerly of Wingham and Chatham, Ont.,' London and Montreal.

The motion favoring union of Allison University was moved by Dr. B. C. Borden, the retiring president, seconded by Dr. G. J. Trueman, the incoming president, and was unanimously adopted.

LETTER CRITICIZING THIRD MARRIAGE KILLS WOMAN, 76 Worry Over Anonymous Note De nouncing Hasty Wedding Blamed for Her Death

The receipt of an anonymous letter is said to have caused the death of Mrs. Sarah Ann Freegard, 76 years old, of Bremhill, Wiltshire, who died two months after her marriage to her third husband, reports "The London Daily Mail."

Mrs. Freegard's second husband died early last November. After a very brief courtship, Mr. Jacob Freegard proposed to her and was accepted on Christmas Day, and they were married at the village church on January 17. The bridegroom had also been twice married before and had celebrated his golden wedding with his second wife.

Mrs. Freegard's health had always been good and her friends believed that many years of life lay before her. A few days after her wedding, however, she received an anonymous letter which said: "You might have paid your late husband's funeral expenses before buying a wedding dress. If you do at die the blaze will run away with Jacob."



Foster Parents of Georgia Negro Girl to do the volume of work that her Arrested After Her Rescue. foster parents, Bishop and Nanny Ros-ser, negroes, thought she should. The Fort William shows the way in municipal abattoir administration. It rents a plant from private owners and last year showed a cash profit to the city of \$19.75 over and above the cost of rental, salaries, supervision and upkeep. The city has avoided capital investment for a municipal abattoir. That it is fulfilling its purpose, is evidenced by the year's work:—Animals slaughtered, 3,558; meat condemned as unfit, 4,645 pounds.

Greenville, Ga., April 18—After being tortured with hot irons and whipped with a lash until she could hardly stand, eleven-year-old Hattie May Rosser, a negro girl, was rescued by white people. They were so terrifying that investigation was made, with the result that both the Rossers were taken into custody on charges of assault and battery and the child was brought here. Women designated by the Ordinary to examine the child reported that her body is scarred by burns and lash marks from her neck to her feet.
