Why Germany Lost In World's Greatest Battle

"We are at the decisive moment of the war," declared the Kaiser on March 21st, as he launched his tre-mendous armies against fifty miles of the Allied front in France in the greatest battle of this or any war; and on the same day he declared that "the prize of victory must not and will not fail us," and announced warningly that this prize "was no soft peace ,but one which corresponds with Germany's interests." A week later, when the first impetus of the colossal onslaught had made a dent twenty-five miles deep in the bending but unbroken battle-line of the Allies, General von Ludendorf, who is said to be the brains of the German General Staff, announced "that victory has been won," and added significantly "but nobody can see what will result from it."

But victory was not won, as the best informed war-writers everywhere remind him. "So long as the battle ends, as there is every prospect that it will end, with our armies and those of our Allies intact and in a position as strong as they have ever occupied, Germany will have failed and failed decisively," declares Major-General McLachlan, Military Attache to the British Embassy at Washington.
