WILL BE A HOT FIGHT.

TARIFF TO COME UP IN THE SENATE MONDAY.

Changes Made by the Finance Committee in Canada Products—The New Budget of Mr. Mackenzie.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 18.—The tariff fight in the Senate begins on next Monday. It is to be a hot one, for the western Republicans do not like the committee bill as well in some respects as the McKinley bill.

A full meeting of the Senate finance committee was held to-day, at which the chairman, Mr. Morrill, was authorized by a committee party vote, to report the tariff bill with amendments. Mr. Morrill did so soon after the Senate adjourned, and it was not expected that it would be brought up for consideration earlier than a week from Monday next.

The tobacco schedule is unchanged. Barley—35 cents per bushel (reduced from 40 cents). The provision allowing a drawback on sugar used in the manufacture of confectionery is struck out.

Iron plates—15 cents per hundred (reduced from 20 cents). Fish not especially enumerated—1 cent per pound (reduced from 1.5 cents).

The schedule of wax, tallow and lard, and other animal products, is amended in the following manner: Tallow—10 cents per hundred, instead of 15 cents per hundred.

Woolen and worsted yarns, valued at not more than 20 cents per pound, the duty to be 20 cents, instead of 30 cents.

On blankets, hats and trunks, the duty to be not more than 30 cents, instead of 40 cents.

On trunks and boxes, the duty to be not more than 30 cents, instead of 40 cents.

The limitation in value to \$500 of wearing apparel and personal effects of persons arriving in the United States, which may be admitted free of duty, is struck out.

Works of art, etc., brought by professional artists, lecturers or scientists, for temporary use on exhibition, not for sale, and now admitted free of duty for the term of six months, may be retained in the country an additional period of six months, in the discretion of the secretary of the treasury.

In the paragraph relating to ungrafted glass lens free, a provision is added providing eight inches in diameter to be grafted to the lens to enable the character of the glass to be determined.
