LEADING MEN BACK ALLANS.

Many Prominent Business Men Signed Their Petition.

Board of Trade Will Investigate-C. P. R. List of Steamer Sailings For this Wint er

The C. P. R. have issued a folder announcing their steamship service for the winter season from St. John. The steamers from this port to London and Antwerp will be the Mount Temple, Lake Michigan, Montrose and Monmouth. To Liverpool, the service will be performed by the Lake Manitoba. Lake Erie and Lake Champlain, and to Bristol by the Monteagle, Montcalm, and Montfort. These three latter boats and the Lake Erie are equipped with cold storage.

The first sailing from Liverpool will be on Nov. 10th, from Bristol Nov. 11th, and from London via Antwerp about the same time.

It is understood that the C. P. R. people are applying to the common council through the board of works for two berths at Sand Point. They ask for numbers three and four absolutely and for the joint use of numbers one and two with the Manchester and Allan lines. Consequent upon the change in the Allan service there will be times when No. 2 berth will be unoccupied, and it is during those times that the C. P. R. wish the use of it. The Manchester berth, too, will be available for about half the time. This question will be considered at the next meeting of the board of works.

Several officials expressed themselves today and agree in claiming that the C. P. R. is not doing anything out of the ordinary course of business. The railway never guaranteed any freight to any line, but this season the company has stated that it will be unable to load the five Allan boats. This is chiefly due to the new C. P. R. service, and no business man would consider that the railway would load other boats in preference to its own. Only a certain amount of freight can be handled from St. John and the railway will not neglect its own steamers for the purpose of giving preference to those of other lines.

Among some shipping men the impression seems to be that the Allans have simply been frozen out and that the withdrawal of two steamers now is merely in order to prevent the withdrawal of the whole service later. They believe that the service arranged by the C. P. R. is the cause of the trouble and that in the near future other lines will be compelled to follow the Allans' example, as the railway will increase its service, give freight to its own boats to the exclusion of others, and will thus gain control of practically the whole export business. The only point not clearly explained by the shippers is why, if the Allans expect I. C. R. freight at Halifax, they could not get the same freight at St. John, and save many miles of haul.

This meeting will have one result. It will cause the price of window glass to advance and jobbers who have been holding off in the expectation that window glass would have a break in prices will get left. FRANCE MAY LOSE ST. PIERRE

LONDON, Oct. 16.—The Newfoundland correspondent of the Globe says that the failure of the French shore shores this season may cripple St. Plerre and Miquelon and creats for France a serious industrial crisis there and in Brittany. On the whole the French eath must be 50 per cent. below that of last season.
