WON RACE FOR KING'S CUP

NEWPORT, N. B., Aug. 17.—The schooner Queen was the winner of the race for the King's cup sailed today under the auspices of the New York Yacht Club. She crossed the finish line 13:22-5 ahead of the other yachts in the race and leading the schooner Ingham, her nearest rival, by two minutes and twenty seconds elapsed time and three minutes twenty-six seconds corrected time. The course was a triangular one of 27 1/2 miles, but windward Queen increased this to 41 miles, which the Queen covered in three hours and forty-six seconds.

BEVERAGE CUP

WON BY MONA

Monon Was Second—Strong Breeze in Saturday's Race, the Robin Hood Being Disusted

The handicap race for the Beverage cup, sailed off Millville Saturday afternoon, was most exciting and had a very close finish. The Mona won; time, 1 hr. 13 min. 18 sec. and the Canada was second; time, 1 hr. 34 min. 52 sec.

A strong sou'-west wind blew during the race, making reefs necessary throughout the course. Just before the starting gun was fired the Robin Hood, owned by T. T. Lantana, was dismasted by a squall. The stick snapped off short and the Robin Hood was thus out of the race before the start.

The Windward, which was to have started, did not race, but the Louvina did, and time handicaps were given the other boats by the race committee.

The boats crossed the line after the gun had been fired at 2:30 in the following order: Canada; Louvina; Vagabond; Fen-Yuen; Chinook; Mona. The order of the finish was the same as that of the start. When time allowances and elapsed time were taken into consideration the result was as follows: Mona, 1st; Canada, 2nd; Chinook, 3rd; Vagabond, 4th; Fen-Yuen, 5th; Louvina, 6th.

The time results were as follows: Mona—Started at 4:25.47; elapsed time, 1:13.47; time allowance, 0.21.7; corrected time, 1:13.16. Canada—Started at 4:27.30; elapsed time, 1:27.30; time allowance, 0.23.2; corrected time, 1:24.12.

The immigration department at Ottawa has sent a circular to police departments and coroners throughout Canada asking to be notified of any immigrants appearing before them as criminals. The immigration officials intend to rigorously carry out the law respecting the deportation within two years of arrival of undesirable immigrants.

E. D. Armand, Canadian trade agent in Newfoundland, has reported to the department of trade and commerce that a new bank, the National Bank of Newfoundland is to be established at St. Johns with a capital of \$2,000,000. The colonial government intends to do all government business with this bank. Mr. Armand states that the colonial catch is turning out much better than was expected earlier in the season and will be nearly up to the average.

A scow being towed out of the harbor on Saturday afternoon by the tug Lord Roberts, upset, and two men who were on board it, Wendell Worrall and George Phillips, had a narrow escape from drowning. They managed to get on the bottom of the scow and held on until the tug Mildred picked them up. The scow was running very high and the men narrowly escaped being washed away from the scow.

On Saturday afternoon Wm. Downie, general superintendent of the C. P. R., accompanied by the committee having west side improvements in hand, inspected a strip of land near the Mill crossing in Fairville, which belongs to the city. It is understood that the C. P. R. is desirous of purchasing this land in order to widen the tracks. The strip is fifty feet wide and extends across the school lot. The committee will report to the common council.

As officers McCollum and Sullivan were patrolling their beat early Sunday morning they discovered a horse and carriage halted in front of Short's livery stable. Looking inside they found a man in a state of helpless intoxication. The horse and carriage were placed in the stable and the occupant assisted to the station so bread him up that he remembered that his name was Wm. Carvill.
