ASSERTS THAT ANTS BOX AND WRESTLE

No injury is ever inflicted in these combats. Miller, one of the wealthiest and most prominent attorneys of this city, was found guilty of aggravated assault and battery upon his sister-in-law, Mrs. Lucy B. Patterson, of Winston-Salem, N. C. The marital troubles of the Miller family have been the subject of much notoriety.

The defendant is said to have cursed Mrs. Patterson, struck her and to have caused her to fiee in her stocking feet through the snow to the home of Colonel Samuel Harden Church, who lives next door to the palatial Miller home.

The present case grewout of an alleged family fight between Miller and his wife on the night of December 14 last, when Mrs. Patterson interfered with Miller, as he is said to have been abusing his wife. Mrs. Patterson was visiting the Miller home at the time of the trouble.

There are several other charges against Miller, all growing out of the same occurrence. He is charged with having shot a constable who endeavored to place him under arrest. His wife also charges him with assault and battery. These cases will be tried at once.

The mixed colony thus produced becomes a pure colony of the queen's species after the workers have ded off unless the supply of slaves is maintained by stealing punae from nelgiboring communities. This is done by a number of species which maintain permanently mixed colonies. The slave drivers adopt various tactics in their raids, some species marching in compact armies, others in scattering detachments.

The most notorious slave raider is the big red Amazon ant, a born soldier, with swordlike mandibles which are murderously effective in warfare, but useless for other purposes. So the Amazons are compelled to rely on their slaves for all household labor and buildings, the care of the young, and so on. They cannot even feed themselves.

LONDON, March 6—The county council elections yesterday did not excite much interest, as they were overshadowed by the political situation. They resulted practically in a deadlock, curicusly, similar to that of Parliament. Fifty-nine municipal reformers and fifty-seven Progressives were elected, and two results have not yet been deckered. If these happen to be on the side of the Progressives, which is likely the parties will be exactly even.

The municipal reformers at the Just election three years ago obtained a majority for the first time since the establishment of the council in 1889, sweeping the polls with the cry "Down With Socialism." The Progressives, wing generally stand for municipal ownership of public utilities, gained twenty one seats today as compared with two gains by their opponents.
