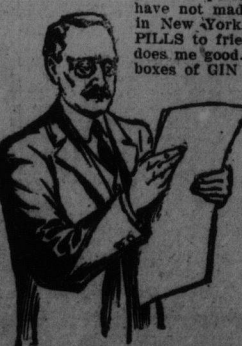

PIRATES CREATE TROUBLE IN HONG KONG VICINITY

Situation Growing Worse and British Cruiser Australia Arrives to Augment Naval Forces.

Hong Kong, Mar. 1.—The situation in the Canton district has become distinctly bad. The British naval forces at Hong Kong have been strengthened by the arrival of the armored cruiser Australia.

A lighter belonging to the Japan Mail Steamship Company, lying in Hong Kong harbor was attacked by pirates last night. They carried off silk to the value of \$30,000 after binding the crew of 16 men left in charge.

Prosecuting Attorney Has Been Engaged on it Over a Week and Now Announces Will Get Down to Business.

Viterbo, Italy, Mar. 1.—After a week of summing up in the trial of the camorristi, Signor Santoro, the crown prosecutor, late today announced that he had concluded only the first part of his address and next would delve into the heart of the case and show who were the instigators of the murder of Genaro Cuccolo and his wife and who the real executors of the deed.

TAXICAB ROBBER MAKES CONFESSION TO OTHER HOLD-UPS

Eugene Spiane Bares Part in New York Robberies Confesses to Three Other Offences.

New York, N. Y., March 1.—Eugene Spiane, one of the prisoners arrested in Tennessee in the \$25,000 taxicab robbery here, has made a complete confession and in addition to telling of his part in the holdup, confessed to three other holdups in the city.

QUEBEC OFFICER ARRESTS SUSPECTS IN UNITED STATES

Quebec, March 1.—Detective McCaskill of the Quebec provincial police arrested this morning at Lewiston, Me., a man and woman who are said to be the parties suspected of being the authors of a sensational murder committed in a parish near Quebec. They are Italians and are commonly known as Joe and Marie. They will not fight extradition and will be brought to Quebec this week.

WILL STAND TRIAL ON BOMB CHARGES IN INDIANAPOLIS

Washington, March 1.—The resistance of a few of the men arrested on the indictments returned at Indianapolis in the alleged dynamite conspiracy will result, according to department of justice officials in preventing their removal to Indianapolis for the hearing set for March 12. The government has instituted removal proceedings in a number of cases. Five or six of the defendants admit their names are the same as those mentioned in the indictment but claim they are not the persons wanted. It is incumbent upon the government to prove their identity and this is causing the delay.

CURED A SICK DOG

Christian Scientist Not Allowed to Cite Cases of Persons Treated But Testimony About Canine Permitted.

New York, March 1.—The jury in the case of Willis Vernon Cole, a Christian Science practitioner charged with practicing medicine without a license, was unable to agree on a verdict today and was discharged.

This was expected to be a test case of the right of Christian Scientists to apply the tenets of their faith to the curing of disease for pay. The trial was marked by spirited arguments between counsel as to the validity of the Christian Scientists' belief.

Samuel Entenmyer, Cole's counsel who argued that his client was only practicing his church's tenets when he healed, offered to prove by fifty or more witnesses the curing by Christian Science treatment of cases of disease given up by physicians, but objection to the offer was sustained. Cole, however, was allowed to testify that he had successfully treated a dog whose owner then became a Christian Scientist. There will probably be a second trial.

WILL STAND TRIAL ON BOMB CHARGES IN INDIANAPOLIS

Patrick Farrell and Frank Webb Will Not Appeal from Decision of Commissioner Alexander in New York.

New York, March 1.—Patrick Farrell and Frank C. Webb, union labor leaders indicted at Indianapolis for alleged violation of the interstate commerce law in transporting dynamite from state to state, will have to go to Indianapolis for arraignment March 12. U. S. Commissioner Alexander decided today. Farrell and Webb had been at liberty under \$10,000 bail each during the proceedings and bail was continued. They will not appeal.

Mr. Cochrane replied that it was not signed, but an agreement had been arrived at as to the terms.

The provincial government guaranteed \$25,000 a mile. The company could issue bonds for \$10,000 a mile and there was also the federal subsidy of \$6,400 a mile.

In addition the federal government guaranteed bonds for bridges to the extent of \$1,000,000. There would be a further issue allowed to provide for betterments.

Replying to further enquiries the minister of railways said the line was already approved from Andover to St. John.

The House adjourned at 12.45.

NEW BRUNSWICK IS NOT REPRESENTED IN DEFENCE LEAGUE

P. E. I. and Saskatchewan Also in Background—Cavalry Association Resolution Favors Conscription.

Ottawa, Mar. 1.—The first annual general meeting of the Canadian Defence League was held in a senate committee room today and was attended by senators, members of the Commons, military officers, educationists and others, representing all the provinces excepting New Brunswick, Saskatchewan and Prince Edward Island.

Hon. Mr. P. Landry, Speaker of the senate, presided during the greater part of the two sessions. The head office of the league was fixed at Toronto, and a strong general council was selected which convened immediately after adjournment and selected an executive committee for the management of an aggressive campaign during the year. Amongst the incidents of the day was the reading of a resolution passed unanimously by the cavalry association, favoring universal training for Canada.

San Jose, Costa Rica, March 1.—Secretary of State Knox and his party arrived here this evening from Panama, coming by special train from Port Limon, where they landed this morning from the U. S. armored cruiser Washington. An elaborate program has been arranged in honor of the American secretary's visit to Costa Rica.
