Germany's Week of Mourning Didn't Prove a Succe

Paris, Sunday, May 18.—(French mourning in Germany, decreed by Wireless Service.) — The week of the government because of the government because of the terms of the peace treaty, appears to have met with little success. London, May 19—The division of the German mercantile shipping, which has been the subject of considerable discussion in England since the announcement that America was to receive all vessels interned in American ports, was raised in the House of Commons, today, by Ben Tillet. Labor member for North Salford.
