Democracy Set at Nought.

Further, if this trade was allowed
to continue the claim of the people

That an inspector should arbitrarily
name an amount for a fine was an
evidence of carelessness in the sys-
tem. It was his opinion that there
were enough experienced inspectors
in the province now to instruct their
appointees to those positions so
that they would be able to do the
work in a better way than that.

Police Official Applied Knowl-
edge Gained to Good Advan-
tage on Heat Victim.

The value of "First Aid" training
to the local police force was demon-
strated yesterday morning when one
of the Maritime Provinces men
became efficient in the application
