

SIMONDS AND LOCH LOMOND AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY FAIR

Large Crowd Present Yesterday Despite Bad Weather—Exhibition Best in History—Great Advance in Class of Produce, Cattle, Horses and Articles in Ladies' Department—G. Fred Stephenson Won Silver Trophy.

For many years past great interest has been taken in Simonds and Loch Lomond Agricultural Society Fair held at Loch Lomond and it seems that each year proves better than the previous ones, this may be said of the annual fair held yesterday as competitor judges in the various classes informed the Standard representative that the exhibition was all as good if not superior to those shown in the much larger exhibitions throughout the province, and it was doubtless if they could be held in Canada.

The farmers in the County districts are not only working hard to make a fairly prosperous living on their farms but are letting no opportunity pass to better the class of their produce, cattle and horses, and any visitor who was present at the fair yesterday could easily testify that the exhibitors deserve every credit for the showing made. The judges in nearly every department had considerable difficulty in awarding the prizes so close was the competition and there was not one entry that was not of the very best.

In the exhibit of produce the Loch Lomond fair never before had such a large and first class number of entries in turnips, beets, potatoes, carrots, squash, pumpkins, cauliflower, parsnips, etc., and in the potato exhibits it might be stated that while there were many fine exhibits, and the competition was very close, G. Fred Stephenson of Golden Grove captured the majority of prizes and was made happy when it was announced that he had won a handsome gold lined silver cup suitably engraved and given by the Banking firm of J. M. Robinson and Sons, Ltd., for the best assortment of potatoes.

In the exhibition of cattle, A. E. Joseph, R. J. Young, Fred Stephenson, F. B. Watters, Wm. Porter, James McParlane, John McPate, W. R. McPate and Albert Norris were the principal winners.

ENTHUSIASTIC CONVENTION OF CHARLOTTE CO. CONSERVATIVES

Every Parish Represented With Full Delegation—R. Watson Grimmer the Unanimous Choice of Government Supporters—Victory at Polls Certain.

Special to The Standard, St. Stephen, Oct. 12.—In the largest and one of the most enthusiastic county conventions ever held in Charlotte county, held here this afternoon, R. Watson Grimmer received the unanimous nomination of the Government party as the candidate in the coming election.

The convention first assembled in the Town Council Chamber, but this was soon so filled that the party had to move to the Curling Rink, which had been placed in readiness for the big public meeting this evening.

Resolutions were adopted expressing confidence in R. Hon. Arthur Meighen as leader of party, and as Premier of the Dominion; in Hon. Dr. Baxter as Federal Minister from New Brunswick, and endorsement of the policy of the Party as everywhere enunciated by Premier Meighen.

On recommendation of the nominating committee the following executive committee was elected:—H. W. Smith, G. K. Greenaway, Jas. Monahan, M. B. Bakwin and H. S. Morrell.
