16. The last intelligence from the Bella Coola River announces that the valley is crowded with Indians from the interior, who wish for the re-establishment of peace, "Capet Silux." "An end to anger," is the universal cry. The Governor has availed himself of this favorable feeling to organize, without additional expense to the Colony, a third party, consisting of a few New Westminister Volunteers, ten Marines and some friendly Indians, who will, with every prospect of success, make a descent upon a valley not far from the Great Slide, in which it is known that several of the Murderers of MacDonald's party are now hid.

17. The Governor, accompanied by myself, proceeds at once to Alexandria. His great object in accompanying the force from Bentinck Arm was to secure moderation from the white men in their treatment of the Indians. He was determined to cause justice to be legally enforced, even in the wildest districts of British Columbia, and to show that the Government could remain calm and self-possessed under circumstances calculated to create exasperation.
