Boy Scouts in Great Britain Preparing to Celebrate. The Boy Scouts of the United Kingdom are being invited by Gen. Sir R.S. Baden-Powell the Chief Scout to co-operate with him in carrying out an ambitious scheme to celebrate the signing of peace. The principal feature is to be the organizing of a chain of bonfires all over the country. Already the various scout county associations have been informed of the proposal and urged to lose no time in putting in hand the necessary preparations. As the first step, it is suggested that the troops in the various localities should find out by expeditions and experiments which are the best hilltops or spots visible to each other as sites for the bonfires. In one or two counties this work has already been carried out and the sites have been marked on maps. Each troop is asked to obtain leave to use its site, and to collect with its troop cart the necessary material for the bonfire much of which it is hoped will be given in kind by neighbors. The Boy Scouts' peace celebrations are also to include whenever the necessary arrangements can be made, the holding of a "Lambeth", of public display of the many and varied functions of the Boy Scout movement, including a full-dress review. These celebrations, which will take place in the summer, will be singularly appropriate, for they will also mark the completion of ten years of the Boy Scout movement, which was founded by General Baden-Powell in 1909. Boy Scouts overseas are also to be encouraged to celebrate peace in a manner befitting the occasion, and it is expected that the lighting of beacon fires will figure prominently in the programme.

Mr. Hinton to Continue as Manager of G.T.P. Ottawa, March 10.—Hon. J. D. Reid to-day entered on his duties as receiver of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway system. Operation of the road is otherwise being carried on as heretofore. W. P. Hinton, general manager, is in charge of the management, and has agreed to conform to the requirements of the order-in-council under which Dr. Reid was appointed. Each company included in the G.T.P. system and its officers, is required under the terms of the order to facilitate the carrying out of the powers and duties of the Government receiver, and all books and papers, real or personal, property of each of the companies are without delay to be handed to the receiver or his nominees or placed under his control in such manner as he may direct. Government Not Liable Provision is made under the order that nothing done under its provisions "shall render the Government of Canada or the Government receiver or anyone acting under the authority of the Government receiver or of the Exchequer Court liable to the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company of Canada, or to any company included in the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway system or to any creditor or holder of any bonds, debentures, debenture stock or other securities of the said companies, or any of them, for any claim by reason of the making of this order, or of anything done or to be done under the authority hereof or under the authority of the Government receiver or of the Exchequer Court, nor shall any officer or agent of the Government of Canada, which the Government might lawfully make or take, had this order not been made." All officers, except the board of directors of any company included in the G.T.P. system, are to continue to discharge for the Government receiver, till further orders or directions by him, duties in connection with operation and management of the road, similar to their present duties, so that no interruption in the operation and management may occur.
