

XX. OF THE ORGANIST.

The organist shall hold office at the pleasure of the Dean and Chapter, and, through Mr. Precentor, shall learn what duties they require of him, and shall efficiently perform the same. The stipend shall be not less than \$500, and he shall have a house when that may be. He shall be subject to correction and dismissal by the Chapter with ~~an~~ appeal to the Bishop.

XXI. OF THE LAY VICARS.

The Lay Vicars shall hold office at pleasure of the Dean and Chapter, and shall, through Mr. Precentor, learn what is required of them and execute the same. And being truly ministers of the Church of God, it is not seemly that they, nor yet the Organist, should be other than communicants of good standing in the Church and well esteemed in the city. They must order all their conversation purely and discreetly, their worship in the Church most reverently, their preparations in the Vestry very silently, their books, desks and apparel neatly. They must be solemnly admitted in Choir after being prayed two months. Their number to be eight or more, their stipends not less than \$300, when funds are provided. No minister to sing in or frequent any convenience. Every man to have his Bible in the Church, and read on it in the Lessons, and all places in the music books to be found before the service and marked according to due regulations. The Precentor is answerable for these things being duly ordered and kept.

XXII. OF THE CHORISTERS.

i. The Choristers, being younger ministers of the Divine worship, are to be cared for sincerely as to their good morals and manners, their good teaching and advancement in life. The Choir scholarships, when provided, are to be strictly bestowed and payments made to or for the boys, as
