Railway Engine Explodes.
Johnstown, Pa., March 16.—While going west past Bolivar Station, on the Pennsylvania Railroad, yesterday, a locomotive hauling a long train of empty cars blew up, killing Engineer George Ribbitt, probably fatally scalding Fireman George Hysong and Conductor Griffith Hare and injuring a dozen of a crew of 30 trackmen, who were working at the place.

KEEP THE BUILDING.

The city will keep the old market shed. None of the tenders for the shed came up to what the Council thought that the building was worth.

Mayor Cowan suggested that it might be well to consider keeping the building and using it as a storage building for the corporation machinery. The matter was referred to the Property committee, and they were instructed to consult the chairman, J. T. O'Keefe, of the Board of Works, and City Engineer E. B. Jones. They have had an informal meeting and decided to keep the building. An effort is being made to secure a piece of property from the Chas. Mount estate, adjoining the Klondyke Hotel. If this is secured the building will be moved there and used as a storehouse.
