

#### DIED AT AGE OF 110

MRS. NEVE, OLDEST WOMAN IN ENG-LAND, PASSES AWAY.

Friend of the Late Queen Victoria-Met Marshal Blucher and Entertained the Prussian General After Waterloo-She Made a Trip to Russia When 92 Years Old-Received at Rouge Huis.

Mrs. Margaret Neve, King Edward's oldest subject, died on Saturday, April 4, 1903, at her home, in Guernsey. For 110 years she preved her health, strength and even her eyesight, and was known throughout the United Kingdom.

Mrs. Neve lived the simple life of a counry gentlewoman and was keen-ly interested in her estate, over which he walked unaided by stick or arm. She retained the old fash-toned fondness for the darning needle, work which she accomplished without glasses.

Among the many accomplishments of Mrs. Neve, who entertained Marshal Blucher shortly after the battle of Waterloo, was a translation which she made of Dante's works into French. She had been a widow for the last half century, had no children, and in May would have been 111 years of age.

The fact of the great age of Mrs. Neve is substantiated by the preservation of her baptismal register. Beautiful grounds surround Rouge Huis, the home of Mrs. Neve.

Mrs. Neve's first recollection seems to be that of leaving her native island at the age of thirteen, in order to proce d to Bristol, situated between the counties of Gloucester at d Somer et. to be educated. This trip had, of course, in those days to be accomplished in a sailing boat.

Mrs. Neve's impressions of the great hattle of Trafalgar were rather first, but of Waterloo, fought in the year of her marriage, 1815, she had the most vivid recollections. She wed ded a Kentish gentleman, and a west twenty-five years of coming in his iness 'traveling about the four in her age of the historic field.

It was her custom to partake of only three meals in the course of the day, and to cat absolutely nothing between them. Against afternoon tea she set her face life a flint, and nobody could persuade her to drink the beverage except at the usual hour for supper. #### DUBLIN'S FINE PARK

ALMOST IRREPARABLE DAMAGE DONE BY RECENT HURRICANE.

1.242 Forest Trees and 1,706 Thorn Trees Blown Down-Phonix Park Referred to in the British Commons as "The Finest Park in the World"-Antiquarians on Origin of Its Name.

Of all the damage done by the teror all the tailings done by the ter-rible gale that lately ravaged the greater part of these islands the most irreparable is that caused in the Phonix park, Dublin, says Lloyd's Weekly Newspaper. The most irreparable is that caused in the Phonix park, Dublin, says Lloyd's Weekly Newspaper. The storm swept through the famous park with hurricane force, uprooting the stoutest oaks and patriarchal elms, and strewing the ground with timber in an incredibly short space of time. When the keepers came to go round and count the number of the fallen, they found the casualties very much heavier than they had expected. No less than 1,242 forest trees and 1,706 thorn trees had been blown down by the hurricane. A question on the subject was asked in the House of Commons. Replying to Mr. J. O'Cennor, the Chief Secretary for Ireland said irreparable damage had been done to the finest park in the world. The epithet evoked instant an ous applause from the Irish benches. The timber was to be sold, added Mr. Wyndham, the monry so obtained to be appropriated in so obtained to be appropriated in aid of replanting the Phoenix park.

Dublin's Phoenix is held to be a corruption of fionn-uisec, pronounced fin-uiske, which signifies to be a corruption of fionn-uisge, pronounced fin-uiske, which signifies in Erse a spring of running water. In the Middle Ages it belonged to the Knights Hospitallers, who held it down to the time of Henry VIII., and then surrendered it to the Crown. Charles II. enclosed it as a deer park. The Earl of Chesterfield, who was lord-lieutenant in 1747, earned the gratitude of Irishmen by obtaining the park for the people. It was he who laid it out and erected the pillar from which it takes its modern name. The column is 30 feet in height, and is surmounted by a phoenix, which is depicted as rising out of the flames, in defiance of the antiquarians. It is not all of the Phoenix park that is open to the public. The total area is 1,760 acres, and of these the people have access to 1,360. The seven mile walk round the park is one of the most enjoyable that could be obtained anywhere. Broad roadways run past ornamental beds and lawns, and through small forests of trees. Away in the south rise the blue mountains of Dublin and Wicklow, which complete a picture of great natural beauty.


