AT LAST!

The City Council at its meeting on Monday evening took the initiative in the matter of a new pavement for Victoria avenue, repeatedly urged by this journal. The action is resultant upon a heavily signed petition from the ratepayers on the street.

This work cannot be inaugurated too rapidly. Next summer ought to see a splendid new pavement on our avenue, increasing the value of its property twenty per cent. and adding materially to the beauty of this charming thoroughfare.

THE TELEPHONE FRANCHISE

The members of the City Council are to be congratulated on at last concluding a straight-forward and business-like agreement with the Bell Telephone Company.

Herrings in abundance seemed to be drawn across the track. There was the municipal system conception—a mammoth air-castle with expense and worry alone assured—the “open matter” proposal with its unpleasant suggestiveness and an abundant and more or less alluring et al.

However, the aldermen have finally reached the desired goal—a practical, business contract, and a good bargain for the city has been consummated.

Chatham receives nearly double per annum what she received under the former franchise and the sum is paid in straight cash, viz., \$400 per year. There is none of the “free phone” racket with its unbusiness-like notions.

Altogether the contract is a sound and good one—and the Council is to be commended for concluding it.

THE CLAIMS OF KENT

The southern counties of Ontario, that is, the counties on the north shore of Lake Erie, with the exception of Seneca, Caledonia, and Windsor, who is supposed to represent the French-Canadian population in Western Ontario, are without a representative in the Senate—the Upper House.

Representation in the Senate should be based upon territorial considerations as much as possible; but recent appointments have indicated that the Government has given up the old custom to a greater or less extent.

The southern counties without an English speaking representative, we believe, have a claim to the vacancy that now exists in the upper chamber through the death of Dr. Landarkin of Hanover.

What about the claims of Kent County? The Planet can see no reason for the repeated ignoring of the claims of men like ex-Mayor Hugh Macdonald, N. H. Stevens and others almost equally deserving of recognition if our member, Mr. Geo. Stephens, does his duty in the matter.
