out, the streets being very wide, and crossing each other at right angles. It has five squares, in one of which stands the Colonial Building, St. Paul's Church, the County Market House, the Law Courts and General Post Office. At the western end of the city is Government House, a two-story wooden structure, fronting the harbor, and Government Farm, containing about 75 acres of land. Georgetown, the capital of King's County, and Summerside, the commercial capital of Prince County, are seaport towns.

PLACES OF INTEREST IN AND AROUND CHARLOTTETOWN.

THE STREETS

of Charlottetown are wide and spacious, and are laid out at right angles. Queen Street and Water Street are the principal thoroughfares, and with Queen Square contain most of the Mercantile Establishments.

MARKET, OR QUEEN SQUARE,

facing on Queen Street, between Richmond and Grafton Streets, is in no sense of the word a Park or a place of recreation. On it stands the Market House, a large two-story building, (which is opened daily, (sundays excepted,) for the sale of all kinds of country produce, meats, fish, &c.) The upper story is called the "Market Hall," and is the largest in the city. On the same square are the Post Office, Provincial Building, New Law Courts, and St. Paul's (Episcopal) Church, the latter facing on Prince Street.

KING SQUARE

lies on the line of Kent Street, between Hillsborough and Weymouth Streets. It is fenced in, and many ornamental trees have been planted in it, but it is not used as yet as place of promenade.

HILLSBOROUGH PARK

is in the line of Richmond Street, is much larger than King Square, and like it, lies between Hillsborough and Weymouth Streets. It is laid off in paths which cross it at right angles, and diagonally, and has in the centre a platform for the use of the band.

PROVINCIAL BUILDING.

This fine edifice is situated on Queen Square, at the Junction of Great George Street. It was built of Nova
