The road bed throughout should be made about 24 feet wide and should have a slope from the centre to each side of at least 1 to 12. The wheel way throughout should receive a new dressing of Macadam 8 feet in with and 6 to 8 inches in thickness. S. O. 1897) as amended Following are the sections dealing with this matter.

"If the company permit or allow their road to remain out of repair for the period of nine months next after the time fixed by the Inspector of Toll Roads, as in this Act provided, to repair the same, the company shall for-feit all right to their road. and the municipal council of the county through which the road or any part thereof passes may enter upon and take possession of the same, and exercise the same jurisdiction over the same as the road company owning the road was entitled to under this act, and the municipal council may repair the same in accordance with the award of the Inspector of Toll Roads in reference to the same and after the repairs have been made by the municipal council, may levy and collect tolls from all travellers thereon, and possess and enjoy all rights and powers, and be subject to all the duties and requirements of this act. in refer ence to such toll roads. R. S. O. 1887,


