ANOTHER VICTORY

This Time the Chatham Cricketers Defeat Amherstburg.

Fine Batting and Bowling by some Members of the Home Eleven.

The Chatham cricket club squared accounts with the Amherstburg club yesterday on Tecumseh Park and restored the gloss to their escutcheon tarnished when the two clubs recently met at that town. Chatham played two complete innings, but before time the Amherstburg eleven had not completed their second innings, so the match was decided on the first innings, Chatham winning by 58 runs. Kenny's batting in the first innings was a feature of the game. He put together 41 runs by splendid cricket. P. Miller also did some fine work and he was well set when he was unfortunately run out. Roy Miller was the only other Chathamite to reach double figures, being retired for 15 runs. In the second innings Roy Miller with 18, Percy Miller with 17 and Richards with 11 runs were the highest scores. Stott and Turville were the only batsmen with the visitors who reached double figures. The bowling of Kenny and Aitken were features of Amherstburg's first innings. In the second innings Miller and Atkinson both did some excellent work in this respect.
