Will Have to Bear Part of the Cost of the War

But Still Sir Michael Hicks-Beach Can Only Promise the British Taxpayer a Higher Budget Than Ever.

London, Nov. 14.—Sir Michael Hicks-Beach, Chancellor of the Exchequer, speaking in Bristol, said it would not be his privilege in the next budget to relieve the taxpayers. He wished he could say that he was not about to increase the bodget, but the Government's expenditure had been enormous especially in China and South Africa. He declared emphatically, however, that the wealth of the Transvaal would have to bear part of the South Africa expenses.

"Of course," said Sir Michael, we must not spoil the future of the Transvaal by attempting to impose upon it a greater burden than it could reasonably bear. That would be cutting our own throats. Therefore the British taxpayers must also bear a larget part of the cost of the war."
