Golden Text—"Thou shalt remember
the Lord thy God."

1. Study the character of Moses

The threatened quarantine of hogs
in Tilbury East, will not be so serious
as some anticipate, with reasonable
care on the part of farmers. While
the quarantine will last six months
it is more than likely the shipment of
fat hogs will be allowed, under proper
inspection, and of course the dressed
pork will also be allowed, under cer-
tain restrictions. The prohibition of
the shipment of store hogs may mean
a good thing for the farmers, as they
will get the profits on their feed by
fattening the hogs. The steady ter-
mination of the quarantine itself can
be brought about by the co-operation
of the farmers with the inspectors,
in following out the cleansing and
disinfecting regulations as well as in
a loyal observance of the quarantine.
