CHINESE RAISE FUSILADE

Raid At Regina.

Regina, Sask., Aug. 28.—When officers of mounted police and city police raided Chinese resorts in Regina on Friday evening and took into custody for a few hours some sixty-five members of the Chinese colony they raised a fusilade of international privilege and serious developments are likely to follow.

Yesterday summons were issued before Magistrate William McCausland requiring the presence in his court of city police authorities, while civil proceedings are started in another direction. The Chinamen, who have not taken the oath of allegiance to the British crown, claim residence rights in a foreign country, and as subjects of the imperial empire they are seeking the protection of the consulate.

CONDEMN NEW TARIFF.

West Australia's Legislature Consider It is Dangerous.

London, Aug. 28.—(C. A. P.)—At Perth, West Australia, the Premier's resolution that the new tariff would injuriously affect the primary industries of West Australia, in bringing about a state of depression, fraught with the gravest danger to her existence, was carried in the Legislative Assembly by a large majority.

At Melbourne, speaking in the House of Representatives, Sir J. Forrest said the preference was largely illusory. The figures quoted by Lyne were inaccurate.

Australian Tariff.

London, Aug. 28.—(C. A. P.)—A Melbourne cable states that Sir William Lyne, interviewed, said the new tariff accorded with the statements made by Premier Deakin when in London. The customs revenue for the financial year was estimated at eight and a quarter million pounds with a preference in favor of Great Britain as proposed, but if the preference were not given the revenue would be one and a quarter millions more. The preference in favor of Great Britain was thus 13 per cent.

OPERATOR DEPORTED.

Public Meeting Called to Discuss Telephone Trouble.
