

Under this reconstruction fice reform. Under this reconstruction Lieut.-Col. Biggar, now assistant ad-jutant-general, will become director-general of transports and supplies; Lieut.-Col. Rutherford, director-gen-eral of artillery; Lieut.-Col. Fiset, di-rector-general of medical service and rector-general of medical service, and Lieut.-Col. Weatherbe, director-gener-Lieut.-Col. Weatherbe, director-general of the engineering service. There is to be a director-general of training and intelligence, for which duty Col. T. D. B. Evans, C.B., is said to be slated, a director-general of operations and staff duties. To the latter position an officer of the British regular army will probably be appointed. As before announced, Major Panet, D.S.O., adjutant of the Royal Military College, will likely be Panet, D.S.O., adjutant of the Roya Military College, will likely be brought to Ottawa to succeed Col. Vidal as deputy adjutant-general. The officers involved in the changes described will probably get a step in rank.
