Numbering the Hairs. The number of individual hairs that The number of individual hairs that cover the human scalp is greatly a matter of speculation; but it is supposed to vary according to the thickness and color of the hair. World's Most Ancient Ruins.

The oldest architectural ruins in the world-are believed to be the roclecut temples at Ipsambool, on the left bank of the Nile, in Nubla. The largest of these ancient temples contains four-teen apartments, hewn out of solid stone. The largest single stone used in this work is one which forms a ver-anda-like projection along one side of the main temple. It is fifty-seven feet long, fifty-two broad, and seventeen—one account says nineteen—feet thick. This colossal stone is supported by two lows of massive square pillars four in each row and each thirty feet high. To each of these pillars is attached a colossal figure of a human being, reaching from floor to roof. In front of the, main temple are seated still other colossi, four in number, the two largest being each sixty-five feet high. The ruins are supposed to be 4,000 years old.
