FACTS IN FEW LINES.

Interesting Paragraphs Culled From Many Lands and Containing Much Varied Information.

This year Tasmania will export 1,500,000 bushel cases of apples. Most of them will go to England and Australia.

The exports of Australia in 1904 were \$280,042,056, an increase of \$38,395,636 over those of 1901, the banner year previously.

The house of the Capulets, where Juliet lived in Verona, has been offered for sale and the municipality intends to buy it and convert it into a museum.

The London Academy tells of an old woman who walked into a shop and asked to buy a "circulating library." Inquiry revealed that she wanted a revolving bookcase.

The first bullfight in Madrid after the repeal of the Sunday law was witnessed by 20,000 persons and 50,000 more waited outside the ring to get prompt news of the result.

So fashionable is appendicitis in British society circles that, says London Opinion, when women would rather have it "than a three-quarter length photograph in a magazine."

An institute for the treatment of sufferers from chest complaints, neuritis, catarrh and other maladies by means of opium smoking has been opened by London physicians.

The Hawaiian Legislature has passed over the Governor's veto a law allowing baseball and similar amusements on Sunday and permitting cigar and many other stores to remain open on that day.

The superior board of health of Mexico informs dealers in food products, especially milk dealers, that the use of preservatives in food is prohibited and punishable by the board as food adulteration.

A recently discovered manuscript written by a schoolmate indicates that Napoleon I. knew so little of the French language when he was sent to the military school at Brienne that a private teacher was engaged for him.

A psalter which belonged to Boswell was sold at Sotheby's in London, recently for £15. It contained the inscription: "James Boswell, 1763. I bought this for 2d at Greenwich, when I was working there with Mr. Samuel Johnson."

The value of shells, tortoise and other goods in Cuba last year amounted to about \$75,000 and of sponges \$500,000. Of the latter the United States received about 35 per cent, and Europe the remainder, France being the principal buyer.

Numbering the Hairs.

The number of individual hairs that cover the human scalp is greatly a matter of speculation; but it is supposed to vary according to the thickness and color of the hair. A well-known authority estimates that a red-haired person possesses the fewest, and places the average number at thirty thousand. Black-haired persons, on the other hand, are said to run into one hundred thousand; while the fair-haired have the largest number—all-namely, one hundred and fifty thousand. These figures would form a valuable index to those people whose hair is on the down grade. An excessive falling out could be reckoned at from the number of hairs that are lost, and by counting the number of hairs which are put into the scalp each day some idea might be formed as to how long they are likely to be before they are overtaken with total baldness. Hairs which fall out, however, are not always a "total loss." They often grow again from the root.

World's Most Ancient Ruins.

The oldest architectural ruins in the world are believed to be the rock-cut temples of Bamboon, on the left bank of the Nile, in Nubia. The largest of these ancient temples contains fourteen apartments, hewn out of solid stone. The largest single stone used in this work is one which forms a veritable projection along one side of the main temple. It is sixteen feet long, fifty-two broad, and seventeen—on account says nineteen—feet thick. This colossal stone is supported by two rows of massive square pillars four in each row and each thirty feet high. To each of these pillars is attached a colossal figure of a human being, reaching from floor to roof. In front of the main temple are seated still other colossal figures, the number, the two largest being each sixty feet high. The ruins are supposed to be 4,000 years old.

Alexandra's Strange Position.

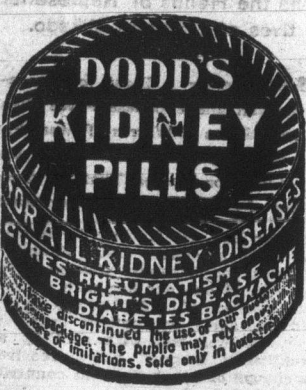
The legal position of Queen Alexandra is very curious. So far as her private business is concerned she is not regarded by the laws and customs of England as a married woman at all. She is the only woman in Great Britain who does not come within the scope of the married woman's property act. The idea of the law is that affairs of state consume all the time of the King and therefore no responsibility for the Queen's private business rests upon him. If the Queen contracted debts in her husband's name he would not be responsible for them as any other husband would. The King cannot be sued for debt, but the Queen can be. Should the King die some authorities hold that the Queen could not marry again in case she wished to do so without the special license and commission of the King's successor.

A Wonderful Book.

The most wonderful book in the world is one which is neither written nor printed. Every letter is cut into the leaf, and as the leaves are laboriously blue and white, it is as easily read as the best printing. The labor required in cutting each letter may be imagined. The work is done so perfectly that it seems as though done by machinery, yet every character was made by hand. The book is entitled "The Passion of Christ." It is a very old volume, and was a curiosity among ages, 1640. It belongs to the family of the Prince of Ligne.

Motor Ferry Boat.

Motor boats on a large scale, built for service instead of sport, are now put into commission. A substitute for the ordinary ferry, and the venture has met with great success. The boat carries several passengers and makes the trip in a time that shows its superiority over the older method of transportation.



Uncovered 48 Skeletons.

While John Fallis, a farmer, living close to the United States boundary, ten miles south of Crystal City, Man., was digging a cellar, he happened upon a gruesome find. The spade of one of his workmen unearthed a human skull. At first it was thought to be from the lonely grave of an Indian, but, upon recommending the excavation, other skulls were met. By evening forty-eight had been taken from the ground. Only two complete skeletons were discovered.

Considerably excited by his mysterious discovery, Mr. Fallis loaded the relics into a wagon and took them to Crystal City, where they elicited much curiosity. Doctors pronounced the bones to be those of white men in a good state of preservation. The consensus of opinion is that the spot had been the scene of some battle with the Indians, and that the victims of the conflict were thrown into a common pit in the haste of flight.
