THE CROPS OF ONTARIO

Acres and Yields in the Province for the Year 1905.

Fall Wheat Seven Bushels An Acre Better Than In 1904—Gain of Over Three Bushels An Acre In Spring Wheat—Barley, Oats and Peas Around the Normal—Comparatively Off Year For Apples.

Toronto, Nov. 21.—The following are estimates of the 1905 crop, computed from returns of actual yields made by threshers and an extra staff of correspondents up to Nov. 1, to the Ontario Department of Agriculture.
Fall Wheat—736,213 acres, yielding 17,933,961 bushels, or 22.5 bushel per acre, as against 9,160,623, and 15.1 in 1904.

Spring Wheat—190,115 acres, yielding 3,532,627 bushels, or 18.5 per acre, as against 3,471,103 and 15.4 in 1904.

Barley—772,633 acres, yielding 24,265,394 bushels, or 31.4 per acre, as against 24,567,825 and 31.5 in 1904.

Oats—2,658,415 acres, yielding 105,562,572 bushels, or 39.6 per acre, as against 102,173,443 and 38.5 in 1904.

Peas—374,518 acres, yielding 7,100,121 bushels, or 19.0 per acre, as against 6,532,886 and 16.5 in 1904.

Beans—50,543 acres, yielding 546,443 bushels, or 10.7 per acre, as against 512,849 and 10.9 in 1904.

Rye—101,392 acres, yielding 1,714,951 bushels, or 16.9 per acre, as against 2,001,826 and 15.3 in 1904.

Buckwheat—101,591 acres, yielding 2,199,652 bushels, or 21.7 per acre, as against 2,066,234 and 20.5 in 1904.

Potatoes—132,530 acres, yielding 14,366,049 bushels, or 108 per acre, as against 15,479,122 and 116 in 1904.

Carrots—5,509 acres, yielding 1,846,650 bushels, or 3.35 bushels, as against 2,022,945 and 3.65 in 1904.

Mangel-Wurzels—49,935 acres, yielding 33,216,930 bushels, or 481 per acre, as against 33,555,440 and 471 in 1904.

Turnips—135,348 acres, yielding 57,654,086 bushels, or 426 per acre, as against 64,861,792 and 487 in 1904.

Corn for Husking (in the ear)—235,005 acres, yielding 20,922,919 bushels, or 70.9 per acre, as against 20,241,014 and 61.4 in 1904.

Corn for Silo and Fodder (green)—184,784 acres, yielding 2,284,812 tons, or 12.36 per acre, as against 2,023,340 and 10.48 in 1904.

Hay and Clover—3,020,340 acres, yielding 5,847,494 tons, or 1.94 per acre, as against 5,239,159 and 1.59 in 1904.

The acreage under the crops enumerated above is 8,975,595, as compared with 8,673,525 in 1904.

The area of cleared pasture land is 3,291,235 acres. There are 45,614 acres in rape, 13,217 acres in flax, 1,997 acres in hops, 5,702 acres in tobacco, 366,613 acres in orchard and garden, 13,719 acres in vineyards.

The estimated crop of apples from 7,018,723 trees of bearing age is 31,380,749 bushels, or 4.47 bushels per tree, as compared with 6.99 in 1904.

INQUIRY INTO INSURANCE.

Senator Domville Announces His Intention to Re-Canada Business.

Montreal, Nov. 21.—Senator Domville yesterday morning announced here that at the next session of Parliament he would formally demand thorough parliamentary investigation into Canadian insurance matters, and will make particular reference to the standing and security offered by American companies doing business in Canada.

Senator Domville states that he tried to bring this matter up at last session, but it was set aside through a hitch in the proceedings.

At this time, however, he states that he is determined to force it through to a finish, as in view of the revelations in the States public opinion demands that the standing of insurance companies in Canada should be thoroughly sifted.

WANT WORK, NOT CHARITY.

Poverty Parades on Thames Embankment Display Red Flags.

London, Nov. 21.—There was another "poverty parade" in the streets of London yesterday. Five or six thousand unemployed men and a sprinkling of women marched along the Thames embankment to Hyde Park, where they listened to speeches and adopted resolutions condemning charity as a cure for lack of employment and demanding the summoning of Parliament to initiate work of national utility.

Red flags were seen, and banners bearing such devices as "Curse your charity, we want work!" and "There is a limit to human endurance!" indicated the temper of the processionists. The march, however, was quite orderly, and the strong force of police on duty had little to do.

Military Training In Schools.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—The Ministers of Education for the various provinces will be invited, within a very short time, to come to Ottawa and discuss the introduction of some sort of military instruction for the schools. It is said the instruction to be given is not likely to go beyond simple drills, setting up exercises and in some cases target practice.

Arrivals From Foreign Shores.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—Immigrant arrivals from Great Britain were 349 less for the month of October than they were for the same month last year, whereas the arrivals from the United States increased by 752. The figures are: United States, 2,042; Great Britain, 3,738. Less than twelve months ago the British arrivals exceeded those from the United States by 616.

Sir Wilfrid's Birthday.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—Yesterday was the sixty-fourth anniversary of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's birthday. He received numerous congratulatory telegrams wishing him long life and happiness.

To Drive Silver Spike.

Edmonton, Alta., Nov. 21.—The C. N. R. propose to drive a silver spike in celebration of the completion of the line into Edmonton.

HORSE TORTURE.
 Slitting the Nostrils is Not Yet a Wholly Obsolete Practice.

Slitting the Nostrils is still practiced in some parts of the world, as in Persia, Mongolia and even in northern Africa, and ponies with slit nostrils are often seen in the Himalayas and in Afghanistan. This mutilation is resorted to in the erroneous belief that the horse can inhale more air when going at a fast pace and also that it prevents neighing, a disagreeable and of much importance during war or when it is desirable to travel as silently as possible. It was practiced in Hungary not long ago, if we are to accept as evidence the copy of a finished work of a horse's head by the celebrated Zoffan, given in Colonel Hamilton's book on horses. It is rather surprising that the fashion was not renewed in England, for two or three centuries ago to prevent a horse neighing it was recommended to tie a woolen band around the tongue. Markham says:

"If either when you are in service in a wars and would not be discovered or when upon any other occasion you would not have your horse to neigh or make a noise you shall take a lyre (band) of woollen cloth and tie it fast in many folds about the middle of your horse's tongue, and believe it, so long as the tongue is to be tied so long the horse can by no means neigh or make any extraordinary noise with his voice, as hath often been tried and approved of."

A very barbarous and useless operation for the prevention of stumbling in horses was fashionable toward the end of the seventeenth and beginning of the eighteenth centuries. This was the exposure of the tendon of a muscle that assists in dilating the nostrils and twisting it around two or three times when it was divided. "In this way you shall see the horse bring his hinder legs to his fore legs almost when you have thus pulled and turned the sinew two or three times." Such a statement will give some idea of the pain the animal experienced during the senseless operation.—London Standard.

A Trunkless Body.

M. Sato, one of Japan's representatives at the peace conference, was chatting with some newspaper men, one of whom suggested that a plain statement was enough for a treaty of peace and that elaborate wording was not necessary. JOUBERT'S PROPHECY.

Foretold Recent Uprising of Russian People—Revolutionists Well Organized and With Plenty of Money.

Some months ago a correspondent of The Daily Telegraph had an interview with Mr. Carl Joubert. The date of the conversation was just after the destruction of the Baltic fleet in the Sea of Japan, and for the most part had reference to Mr. Joubert's remarkable prophecy, which was fulfilled to the letter, as to the action and fate of the Russian fleet. Incidentally, Mr. Joubert talked with our representative of what he termed the approaching revolution in Russia. It is interesting, at the present stage of events in the Czar's dominion, to give publicly to some of the statements made by Mr. Joubert in May last.

Mr. Joubert said:—"The revolutionists do not desire the death of the Czar. We wish him to be the constitutional Sovereign of Russia. The Anarchists and terrorists, filled with a mad lust to revenge all the outrages to which the Russian people have been subjected, desire his blood and that of every member of the Russian royal family. We are fighting the Anarchists and trying to save the Czar. We hope to save him, and to see him one day at the head of a reformed and constitutional Russia. Very soon the time will be ripe for us to show our hand."

"What are the means by which you propose to attain your ends?" "Our methods will be bloodless, if possible. It is no part of our plan to compass the death of a single Russian. If our ends can be accomplished without it, we wish and pray for a bloodless revolution, but if that cannot be attained, then we shall put into operation a scheme the extent and methods of which will amaze the world."

"But Russia is strong, and huge armies and vast sums of money will be required." "We have both," replied Mr. Joubert. "The whole scheme is prepared and ready, and we only wait our time."

"Would not the present be the most favorable opportunity, while Russia, or rather Czarism, as you prefer to term it, is engaged in war with Japan?" "We will not move a finger until peace is made between Czarism and Japan. We do not want it said that our success has been due to the Japanese. We will wait until peace has been established; then we will move. You asked about our men and means. At this moment we have £61,000,000 in cash, most of it in English banks, but we have a large amount also banked in America. We shall require £150,000,000 in gold, and we believe it will be every rouble available by the month of August next. (This was written in May). As for now, we have ten million dollars in gold, and we believe it is money ready to lay down his life for the cause. Of these a large proportion are reservists. In addition, a majority of the men now actually serving in the Russian army belong to us."

"But how will you arm your troops?" "We have at least one-third of the arsenals in Russia at our absolute disposal. In some of the arms and ammunition on which (Russia) will depend for their defense, we have tens of thousands of tons of the ammunition on which Czarism depends is filled with sand.
