Baptist Convention.

The Baptist Convention of the Maritime Provinces held its 52nd annual meeting with the Main St. Baptist church, St. John, Aug. 21-26. Eleven sessions were held—the greatest number in the Convention's history.

Professor Keirstead was elected President by acclamation. The interest of the meetings was increased by the presence of a number of visitors including Rev. Dr. Chivers, the Secretary of the International Baptist Young People's Union, and Rev. Dr. Morehouse, Secretary of the Baptist Education Society of the United States.

The educational meetings were addressed by several speakers, including Dr. Trotter, who also preached the annual sermon, Rev. J. H. MacDonald and Rev. W. B. Hinson. It was decided to undertake to secure \$75,000 for the institutions here.

Mr. J. A. Irving, of the Head Office of the Peoples' Bank, arrived in town on Monday last, to relieve Mr. Thomson, teller of the Wolfville agency, whose vacation commenced that day.

Another missionary family may be sent out this spring. One hundred and fifty marks of progress, over 500 were baptized on the Home Mission fields. Work is carried on among the French, and among the Danes of New Brunswick, as well as among the English of the three provinces.

The Young Peoples' Union had a meeting extending over two days before the meeting of Convention. The devotional meetings were under the direction of the Union and were well conducted. Among the leaders was Mr. J. Edmond Bars, of this town, who gave a fine address.

The Baptist Institute had papers from Rev. G. R. White, Rev. W. H. Warren, Rev. Dr. Steele, Rev. Dr. Chivers and Prof. Keirstead.

Educational Notes for Teachers.

The attention of teachers is called to the prizes offered for samples of school work at the Provincial Exhibition, to begin in Halifax on Sept. 25th.

At the commencement of the Term is the time to prepare a good Time-Table for school work. This should contain the exact hour of each recitation and be a guide to pupils in their desk work.

Most teachers understand that they should send a written notice to the Inspector on the day they open school; but many fail to give all the information required of them.

Let teachers study the register and fill in all they are instructed to fill at the commencement of school. Also see that the register for the year just passed, be placed beside the new one, in the covers, and kept there for inspection when the Inspector visits the school.
