Town Council Meeting.

The regular monthly meeting of the Council was held on Wednesday evening with the Mayor and full Board present.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Reports were received from the Street, Water and Sewer Committees, of routine work done during the month. The Finance Committee reported receipts for the month \$797.77, and expenditures \$1060.15. The debit balance at the bank on March 31st was \$282.98. This was shown to be the smallest at that time in the year for thirteen years. Only once during that time had the overdraft been less than \$100, and on one occasion it amounted to \$675.

Applications were read from John L. Murphy for re-appointment as plumbing inspector. Jas. M. Toye also made application for same appointment.

H. G. Collins applied for re-appointment as superintendent of streets and water-works.

Other bills of E. J. Delaney amounting to \$37.03, for hauling out water pipes, were passed subject to the approval of Finance Committee.

A. M. Wheaton was re-appointed town-weigher for the ensuing year at a salary of \$30.00.

John L. Murphy was re-appointed plumbing-inspector.

The clerk was instructed to notify C. H. Borden that no action could be taken on his application for increase in salary as assessor until he had complied with requirements of Council in such cases.

H. G. Collins was re-appointed superintendent of streets, water and sewers until the annual meeting in Feb. at the same rate as paid last year, provided a satisfactory contract can be made.

Applications were received from E. J. Delaney and Thomas Dakins for permission to keep pigs in the town. Such permission was granted on condition that they be kept in such a manner as not to be a nuisance to the immediate neighbors and with their consent.

The matter of licensing hackmen and teamsters was brought up, and on motion was referred to the Committee on License to report at next meeting.

Many of the best educated men of the world are given to swearing which is nothing more than a habit pure and simple.

By all means swearing should be abolished. It is, however, a matter of education and not of legislation.

Amendments to the Game Laws.

Under the new Game Act, introduced by Hon. Mr. Phips, the close season for moose is from the 15th of December to the first of October, and a hunter may kill but one moose a year. In the Island of Cape Breton moose may not be killed until October 1st, 1915. Before any moose meat can be offered for sale the person who killed the moose must go before a Justice of the Peace and make a declaration that the moose was not taken illegally, and he must also produce the neck and four legs of the animal as evidence. The legs are to be forfeited to the J. P., who must destroy them.

Caribou and deer are prohibited until October 1st 1910, and after that date the provisions regarding the sale of moose come into force with reference to caribou and deer.

Rabbits may not be snared from March 1st to Nov. 1st, and no snare shall be made of wire other than "rabbit wire." Snarers and hedges must not be placed closer than one hundred feet together.

It is unlawful to kill birch, partridge except between October 1st and Nov. 1st, but all other kinds of game birds may be shot from Sept. 1st to March 1st, except in the Island of Cape Breton, where the season opens on August 20th.

Game includes moose, caribou, red deer, American elk, beaver, hares, wild rabbits, mink and animals valuable for their fur, except otters, skunks, woodchucks, raccoons, weasels, bears, wolves, lopecerviers, wild cats, foxes, rats and mice. Canadian grouse or spruce partridge, ruffed grouse, or bird partridge, pheasant, black cock, capercaillie, ptarmigan, sharp tailed grouse, woodcock, snipe, curlew, plover, blue winged duck, wild geese, brant, herons, bitterns, yellow legs and sandpeeps.
