Homestead Regulations. Any even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 8 and 26, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who in the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres more or less.

Application for entry must be made in person by the applicant at a Dominion Lands Agency or Sub Agency for the district in which the land is situated. Entry by proxy may, however, be made at an Agency on certain conditions by the father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of an intending homesteader. The homesteader is required to perform the homestead duties under one of the following plans: (1). At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years (2). A homesteader may, if he so desires, perform the required residence duties by living on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of his homestead. Joint ownership in land will not meet this requirement. (3). If the father (or mother if the father is deceased) of a homesteader has permanent residence on farming land owned solely by him, not less than eighty (80) acres in extent, in the vicinity of the homestead or upon a homestead entered for by him in the vicinity, such homesteader may perform his own residence duties by living with the father (or mother).

(4). The term "vicinity" in the two preceding paragraphs is defined as meaning not more than nine miles in a direct line, exclusive of the width of road allowances crossed in the measurement. (5). A homesteader intending to perform his residence duties in accordance with the above while living with parents or on farming land owned by himself must notify the Agent for the district of such intention. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. N. Arrests have been made by the Madrid police which it is hoped will put an end to the well-known Spanish hidden treasure swindle. The frauds were worked by a regular agency with offices at Madrid. Voluminous correspondence was discovered showing that the agency had persons confined in various prisons to send off the first letter to unsuspecting foreigners, telling the old story of a hidden treasure, which only required capital to recover.

RAN THE RAPIDS

IN SMALL BOAT

Two Young White Men Pass Through Lacine Rapids Safely in 18 Foot Boat.

MONTREAL, Thursday.—The remarkable feat of running the Lacine Rapids in a light eighteen foot skiff was successfully accomplished yesterday by two young dare-devils, Messrs. Dunn and McDonald, members of the St. Stephen Boat Club of Lacine. This is the lightest and smallest craft that has ever successfully attempted the hazardous descent. The Iroquois Indians, living at Caughnawaga, have for generations run the Lacine Rapids at intervals but always in staunch high bowed boats ranging from twenty to thirty feet in length, built especially for the purpose. Dunn and McDonald were two hours making the journey and those who watched them from the adjacent islands main shores, state that they would not have given a brass farthing for their chances of a safe arrival. However they came through without a scratch and so did their skiff.

Well-Known Civil

Servant Dead

OTTAWA, Thursday.—Fred Gellinas, aged 39, secretary of the department of Public Works, died of heart failure early this morning. He has been unable to sleep and at 3 a. m. had arisen and lit a cigar, hoping to quiet his nerves. He had smoked but a few minutes when he dropped and expired. He leaves a wife but no children. He was a native of Ottawa, but for many years was engaged in newspaper work in Montreal. He came to Ottawa in 1896 as private secretary to Hon. J. I. Tarte.

MUNICIPALITIES WIN

RE WATER POWER

OTTAWA, Thursday.—After an hour discussion in the private bills committee of the House today the bill for the incorporation of the Dominion Power Development Company was defeated.

This is the bill which sought to empower a company of Montreal, Toronto and Hamilton capitalists to level off water powers on Ontario and Quebec. This represents a decided victory for the municipalities.

GERMANY VERY FRIENDLY

LONDON, Thursday.—A leading German journal is urging closer relationship with the markets of Canada. The present hopeless muddle, it says, cannot possibly last much longer. The German movement gains interest from the possibility that the Franco-Canadian compact will be deferred by the action of the French Senate.

The Vatican Organ Scores the

Pan-Anglican Congress for

Wordly Actions.

ROME, Monday.—The Observatore Romano, the organ of the Vatican, in an editorial, concerning the recent Pan-Anglican Congress in London, says: Religion without a legitimate hierarchy, although calling itself Christian, is the religion only of this world, as the questions discussed by the Pan-Anglican congress show. Throughout the centuries all religions that have arisen without the seal of the real divine personality are similar to that discussed at the Pan-Anglican Congress. All of them aim at securing the largest amount of joy in this life without caring for the other world.

At the end of a strong attack, the Observatore says that Catholic Rome tomorrow will celebrate with veneration the anniversary of the death of St. Peter at his tomb in the curch which is a miracle of art, and this veneration will answer better than anything else the superstitious poverty of the Pan-Anglican Congress. From the attitude of the Observatore Romana it is supposed that Pope Plus will deal with the recent Congress held in London in his forthcoming encyclical.

THAN TALKED.

OTTAWA, Tuesday.—Fred Taylor, the capital lacrosse player, who in Saturday's match against Toronto had struck Referee Gardin, was arraigned in the Police court this morning on a charge of breach of the peace. The case was adjourned until Friday. Taylor pleaded guilty.
