Elias Bush, aged 72 years, said that he married Catherine A. Bush in 1865, supposing her divorced. Her decree in Chicago was not signed until a year or so afterwards. Bush and his supposed wife had all their money in a rooming house, and Bush had continued to live there because he could not get a roof over his head anywhere else. Judge Murphy granted an annulment of the marriage, and advised Bush to dissolve partnership with Mrs. Bush as soon as possible.

A similar case was that of Frank against Lottie Salott. They went through a marriage ceremony in September, 1906, and lived together until April, 1908. She gave the name of Miss Lottie Salott. Later he found a letter signed Charles Shaver, asking her if she had procured a divorce, and if she had buried the baby. She admitted the previous marriage, but told Salott that she had been granted a divorce at Galena, Ill. Later she said that it was in Wisconsin. The divorce records never were found. The marriage was annulled.

Lillian Armstrong said that Frank G. Armstrong got drunk three times a week and never spent any money on her. A decree was granted in thirty days.

WIFE SPENDS HIS EARNINGS.

Troubles of Fred C. and Carrie Mead were told to Judge Murphy yesterday. The former said he was a waiter, and worked nights; that he turned his weekly earnings over to his wife, who spent them in a round of theatre, skating rink, and dance hall. She left him and went to a boarding house. The lady testified that Carrie's earnings were the same after leaving her husband.

"Did you ask her where she went?" asked Judge Murphy. "Yes, and she told me where I could go," said the witness, explaining the destination. Decree will be granted in thirty days.

Josephine Teedman said that John H. Teedman took playful pokes at her face. A decree will be granted.

Gustave Ziltz said that he married Jennie Ziltz in 1902, and that she habitually followed the cheap theatres and neglected him and her housework. A decree will be granted in thirty days.

Frank Zytowski told Judge Murphy that he did not know whether he would marry the 82-year-old woman, but he was on the court. After remaining in jail all day he came into court teary-eyed and concluded that he would marry.

MAKING OF A NATION.

Fine Address by Rev. J. J. McNeill Last Evening.

Before the Men of James Street Baptist Church.

An Association Formed at Cloes of the Address.

"The Making of Nations," a stirring and patriotic address by one of this country's most able speakers, Rev. J. J. McNeill, was listened to, last night, in James Street Baptist Church by a large audience. The meeting was for the men of this congregation for the purpose of organizing a men's club. The speaker is pastor of Walsley Avenue Baptist Church, Toronto, and the way he handled his subject to the men of this congregation was impressive. A nation must have a physical foundation in addition to one of natural resources to be built upon. Italy is one of the most remarkable in the former respect. Her great number of inhabitants have been the chief staff that have kept her in the fore. Speaking of France, Mr. McNeill said that she was perhaps the most favored nation of the world in regard to her natural resources. The soil is fertile, the water is pure, and the climate is phenomenal in its productive qualities. After the Franco-Prussian war of only a generation or so ago France was plunged into a debt of six billions. She is now the largest lender of money to other nations. In so far as Canada is concerned it has far greater resources than any other nation. "We have merged into the consciousness that we have a great country," said the speaker. "From seaboard to seaboard we have forests, fields and mines and all go to make up a country which gains much in comparison with others. The mountain ranges of Canada are scattered just where they are needed, and rains are not too frequent. The great lakes, the St. Lawrence, the Ottawa, the Red and the Saskatchewan lead to the heart of the country, Canada is a God-favored country."

Speaking of contributions to countries from sources of the present, he said that the laws of their own country were different from those of other countries, and the difference gave pointers to both. When a monarchy is on one side and a democracy on the other, if an extreme of one side, the other extreme is usually found in the other. Through this the world is in a race for supremacy, and one is kept awake and moving by the moves of the other. In individuals the progress of one person makes his neighbor wish to keep up with him, and exert himself to do so, and it is the same with nations. In the success of individual life and national life there has to be an element of conflict. It has been proven time and time again, he said, that the greatest period in the lives of nations were brought about by conflict, civil war, war of nature, commerce, or bloody war. The age of Pericles in Greece was a good example of this. Greece thrived on the struggle with Persia. The Hebrews were at their greatest height as a nation of great men after their war with the Philistines. In the United States an example was to be seen. The struggle brought out the greatest men the country has produced, and it developed the fibre and morals of the nation.

Perhaps the greatest to be mentioned was the Napoleonic war. The present following upon it brought forth such men as Abraham Lincoln and men who were to guide the destiny of the great nations.

"We are living side by side with one of the greatest nations of the present day," said Mr. McNeill, "and we are constantly being put up against it. There are some influences we get from it that are not helpful to us, but many others we get that will keep Canada alert and ready for the struggle for national success."

Speaking of the passage to the Orient, he said that the one now in use was the Pacific, across Canada and across the Atlantic. Through this the Oriental question assumed a greater significance to Canadians than was believed by most. The great Chinese and Japanese awakening means that the religions of the east, the philosophy of the east and the thought of the east will be in conflict with those of the west, and by virtue of the commercial travel across the passage to the Orient, that spreads over Canada, the great battle would be fought in this country to the general good of this country.

Mr. McNeill spoke briefly of the part that women played in the national life. He said there was no greatness without intellectual power, and women helped in this, but there is such a thing as over-intellectualness, and the women of the States seemed to be suffering from this to a large extent. The part women play in national life depends largely on the estimate the men of the nation have of an over-shadowing power of that country, but their very brilliancy and intellectualty are leading them from the mission they have to fulfill.

He spoke of sectionalism as one of the dangers confronting Canada. There were eighty different languages spoken in this country, and the Bible had been translated into sixty or seventy of them. Sectionalism is the danger of the west, western hemisphere, on one hand of which we live. The Canadian type has yet to be moulded and it has to be moulded from the best of these eighty varieties. The difficulty lies in overcoming prejudice, taking all the elements and fusing them into one type. The best of each had to be taken and fused, and the result charged through and through with the spirit of Jesus Christ to bring out the real Canadian type. This a danger is faced, that we shall become heathenized instead of Christianized. They will paganize our type if we do not take them and bring them together as one," he said. It was written that the west should rule the east, and the one thing to be done was for the people of this hemisphere to get together and infuse

KILLED BY TREE.

Boy Brings Home Body of Father Without Aid.

Bay City, Mich., Feb. 17.—"There wasn't anyone to help, so I brought papa's body home with me."

And Charley Kozlowski, 12 years old, gently reminding some one covering from the countenance of his father, exposing the bruised face to the gaze of the weeping wife and mother.

Lorenz Kozlowski was a farmer, who resided 18 miles north of this city. This morning he was falling trees on a small timber plot owned by himself.

The plot is five miles from Kozlowski's house. When he went out there today he was accompanied by his son. A large tree struck a stump in falling and glanced, hitting Kozlowski, pinning him to the ground and crushing his chest. The father retained consciousness long enough to tell the boy to run for help. The youngster ran two miles before finding some one to go with him, and when a rescue party arrived in the timber the father was dead.

"The tree was so large that it could not be moved, and had to be cut with axes before the body could be freed.

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
