



Unrest in Berlin Owing To Further Slump in Mark

Berlin is buzzing with talk of impending outlaws strikes after the mark had suffered a relapse which, once during the week saw it selling at 160,500 to the dollar among unofficial dealers. There was scarcely a household in the city where the question was not raised as to how far the German unit can or will fall. One newspaper answers the question with the simple statement: "In Russia the dollar brings 100,000,000 Soviet rubles."

The new wave of depreciation has intensified the feeling of unrest among the laborers, who have become accustomed to repeated increases in retail prices, which virtually keep pace with the exchange rate while wages follow very slowly.

The trade unions have inaugurated negotiations with Chancellor Cuno and the Minister of Labor with the object of remedying the wage conditions due to the mark's depreciation, but there is widespread fear that the rank and file of the workers, faced by still worse conditions, will get out of hand and strike.

Both Labor leaders and Government officials are searching for some stable measure upon which wages can be based. Labor is said to be divided into two classes; one seeks a straight gold basis while the other favors the use of some other standards to estimate by, such as the price of some essential commodity, believing that the adoption of a gold standard would

be impracticable unless applied simultaneously in all channels of the nation's life. At any rate, it is asserted the workmen appreciate that their wages cannot be put back to the pre-war level, but at most merely placed on such foundation that they may automatically rise with the rate of exchange.

This has already been attempted to a certain extent by the United States Government's index figure as a basis, but depreciation has become so rapid that Labor has become dissatisfied with this system, especially as the index figure is announced only fortnightly.

Some quarters regard the rumbling of outlaws strikes as one of the causes of the mark's new slump; others continue to attribute it to Germany's political prospects abroad and the heavy demand lately among German industrialists for foreign currency.

Thornton Replies To Those Who Criticize

Until the people of Canada intimate that they want me to stop, I shall continue to visit parts of the country and see as many Canadians as I can. I believe this is essential if I am to prosecute the task which the Government of Canada has set me.

In this way Sir Henry Thornton president of the C.N.R. defined his attitude "to certain individuals" who, he said had criticized his course of inspection of the National Railways. He proposed to continue his present policy, he said.

Canada May Restrict Japanese Immigrants

As a result of negotiations which have been carried on between representatives of the Japanese government in Ottawa and the Dominion government it is expected that there will be a very substantial reduction in the number of oriental immigrants coming to Canada during the next few months. If this reduction should not materialize the question of further restricting this class of immigrant may be taken up at the next session of parliament.

Manitoba Liquor Law

The Manitoba Legislature will meet in a short session on July 25 to enact legislation made necessary by adoption by referendum of the Moderation League's bill for Government sale of liquor.

The "beer and wine" bill comes before the electors July 11, and should it carry its provisions also will be incorporated into the law of the province. An effort will be made to conclude business at the session in one week.
