DISCUSS PARTRIDGE SCARCITY AT GAME CONFERENCE IN N.Y.

The scarcity of partridge which has been marked in New Brunswick Nova Scotia, Quebec and the State of Maine this year will form one of the subjects for consideration at the annual meeting of the American Game Protective and Propagation Association in New York this week according to Chief Game Warden L.A. Gagnon who will represent New Brunswick at the conference. While in New Brunswick the partridge have been infested with lice this season and it is believed that their scarcity may be attributed to

his birds, Mr. Gagnon has received a report from the Chief Game Warden of Quebec stating that a periodical scarcity in Quebec will it is believed right itself. Nova Scotia game officials are inclined to the belief however that the scarcity is entirely due to the lice infestations, a large number of birds having been found dead in the woods without any trace of wounds other than those caused by lice. The Game Commissioner for the State of Maine has not in his communication advanced any cause for the shortage experienced in his territory and is rather at a loss to account for the shortage of birds.
