LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Flour has advanced ten cents a barrel in Charlottetown, owing to a raise in the price of wheat in Chicago.

It is said that the Dominion Government has decided to adhere to its original intention, and that the general election will take place in January. Polling day may be fixed for Saturday, January 15.

A flock of thoroughbred Leicester sheep, recently imported from P. E. I. and by the Agricultural Society of New Brunswick, composed of six St. John's few days ago, realized an average of ten dollars a head.

Two hundred head of young cattle were brought over from P. E. Island and passed through the city last night en route to Dallas Centre, Wisconsin, where they are to be utilized for ranching purposes.—Monoton Times.

A MONTREAL despatch says: Mr. Cagran's speech at Granby, maintaining the loyalty of the French Canadian and denouncing the separatist attitude of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Mr. Tarte, has aroused great sympathy here.

The Admiralty Court investigating the loss of the steamer Spotman, rendered a verdict on Friday suspending Capt. Skrimshire for six months "on account of neglecting to take proper soundings and depending too much on the observations he had taken the day before the wreck."

A SYNDICATE headed by W. Barclay Stephens, of Montreal, vice-commodore Royal St. Lawrence Yacht Club, is trying to arrange for the building of a Canadian challenger for the America's cup next year. The suggestion is made that it should be done by popular subscription.

A FIRE broke out in the Webster House, Montreal, at 8 o'clock yesterday morning and gained considerable headway before being discovered. Three firemen were killed, five guests are dead from suffocation, and twenty-five guests, mostly permanent boarders, cannot be accounted for.

At the meeting of the cheese board on Friday, 12 factories boarded 3156 cheese. Dillon and Spillet bought 995 at 11 1/4, balance unsold. Next meeting of the Board on Friday, Nov. 10th at 11.30. This is the same price as was paid Thursday at Brookville, the highest market in the Dominion. The highest price received by the P. E. Island cheese board this summer was 11 7/8 cents.

REV. F. F. FULLERTON, of this city, has been appointed President of the Canadian contingent. He left here Saturday morning for Quebec, and was escorted to the railway station by the city companies of militia and St. James' Boy's Brigade with the military band. A large crowd gathered at the railway station to see him off. The evening before his departure Mr. Fullerton was presented with \$400, the gift of his congregation and some personal friends outside the church. He also replied from the officers of the 4th Regiment, C.A., an address accompanied by \$80 in gold.

The press censorship in the present war is the most severe yet established. Correspondents are not allowed to tell of the movements of troops, nor, it would seem, to say too much about the actual fighting. The case of the Royal Irish Fusiliers is an instance in point. They were ordered from Egypt to Natal, and while the correspondents must have known of their movements, in which many are concerned, nothing came out till the Irishmen were swarming up the heights at Elandlaagte. Evidently the Boers will not learn much of the British troops' movements from what the correspondents get leave to send home.—Ex.

An Ottawa despatch of Saturday says: R. T. Allen, of Kingston, Inspector of agencies for Standard Life Assurance Company of Edinburgh, Scotland, has been in the city for the past few days and has completed arrangements with the Dominion Government for placing a million dollar life insurance on the members of the Canadian Contingent, who are going to the Transvaal. This will give \$1000 insurance to the relatives or heirs of any officer or man who may die during their absence. The insurance will take effect from the time the contingent starts from Quebec, and will be paid on all parties who may die from any cause. The government will pay the premiums.

The officers of the Caledonian Club of Prince Edward Island for the ensuing year, elected at the regular meeting last evening are: Chief, John A. McLarny; President, John McPhoe; 1st Vice, Capt. R. McMillan; 2nd Vice, John Gillis; Financial Sec., Alex. McDonald; Recording Sec., D. R. MacLennan; Treasurer, James Paton; Pipes Peter Ferguson; and a board of nine directors. The following resolution was adopted by unanimous standing vote: Resolved that this Club expresses its regret at the reverses sustained by our fellow-countrymen in South Africa as reported today, and our hearts go out with hope for the early triumph of British arms in the cause of justice and equal rights. After the adoption of the resolution the National Anthem was very heartily sung.

His spouse, however, it seems, was not made acquainted with this fact and started for her Island home to change her lot of single blessedness, but by a remarkable coincidence she arrived in Monoton on Wednesday afternoon while the soldier was here, and on enquiry learned that her intended was among the number. To make a long story short the couple met and were married during the afternoon, the soldier continuing his journey with his comrades en route to the Transvaal, while the young bride went home to Charlottetown yesterday to await his return after the war.
