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THEFT OF \$15,000 WORTH OF FURS

Dr. Egge, of Moorhead, Minn., Killed Near His Home. Moorhead, Minn., Sept. 7.—Frank Ketchikan, carpenter, of Fargo, has been arrested as a suspect in the murder of Dr. Thron S. Egge. It was alleged that he had had trouble with the doctor the previous day, and he was at once taken into custody by the police on suspicion. Dr. Egge, one of the leading physicians of this city, was murdered at 11:30 last night within a hundred feet of his home. His head was battered out of his brains by a heavy iron bar in the very heavy wind that was blowing so they were forced to land. Wet from spray and exposed to the icy north the men could not endure the exposure, and when relief arrived five of them had died.

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
